Dear brothers and sisters,

After enduring a stretch of days where hatred and darkness seemed to dominate, I finally found relief last week, and, no surprise, it came by being in your company.

First, it was a joy to return to church on Sunday after a couple of weeks of vacation, to see your faces, to break bread with you, and even to share painful conversations about the events in Charlottesville. I feel so blessed to spend my Sundays with you all.

But that was not the end of my Sunday at church, nor was it the end of my blessings. Later that afternoon I returned to St. Luke's to preside over the renewal of marriage vows for Sarah and Kevin Muoio. It was a small gathering but the emotions ran strong, especially as their son, Luke, powerfully read a lesson from their initial wedding and their daughter, Emeline, beautifully (and bravely) sang a song, in tribute to their marriage. There was hardly a dry eye in the church when she finished.

It was so moving to celebrate their twenty-year marriage. Such celebrations do not come often nor easily. I was deeply touched that their celebration included not only a renewal of vows but a renewal of the blessing upon the life they have shared. Perhaps most powerfully, the ceremony honored God's place in their marriage, in their family, in their daily lives. There was no mistaking God's light bursting out from it all and I felt blessed to witness it.

Likewise, I felt blessed to be part of a very different gathering that took place less than twenty four hours later—this a gathering to witness not light but darkness (although a darkness wholly different from the kind we experienced in Charlottesville).

Monday afternoon, twenty five people stood in our church parking lot to take in the near-total eclipse. The sight was as spectacular as advertised. But for me, what was happening on the ground was almost equally moving.

Two days before, parishioner Pete Haynsworth emailed me to say that he had a homemade viewing device and wondered whether folks at St. Luke's might be interested in taking advantage of it. Besides being impressed by his ingenuity, I was grateful for his thoughtfulness. Sunday Pete announced that he would be setting up in our parking lot the following day and all were invited. What followed made the eclipse experience all the more memorable.

Folks began showing up around 2:00PM for the estimated 2:47PM “best moment.” Some came alone; some came with family; and some brought friends. You could sense the excitement and anticipation in our chatter. In addition to Pete’s device—which was terrific—a few of us also brought along viewing glasses. As the peak time neared, the parking lot filled and strangers from the neighborhood joined our band of spectators. Soon, parishioners, family, friends, and strangers mingled, passing around the few glasses, lining up to look at Pete’s science project, and sharing impressions.

At one point, as I was standing on the periphery of the crowd, I found myself overwhelmed by a sense of joy and peace. Sure, the eclipse was stunning. But more beautiful to me was the kindness, the generosity, the welcome to friends and strangers alike. I thought to myself, this is what it means to be God’s family. This is how Jesus imagined strangers to become friends. This is what it looks like to let the light of Christ shine through us.

One dad had joined our group with his two daughters and a cereal box in hand. Intending to view the eclipse from the playing field, they found themselves swept up in our crowd’s invitation. Soon, he and his daughters were a part of the line looking at Pete’s display and a part of the cluster passing around the few glasses. When it all ended and they prepared to go home he said, “Thank you so much for inviting us to join you. I am so glad we came out!”

As I drove home after our viewing party, I recalled something I had said to Sarah and Kevin the day before. “There are two ways to live life,” I told them, quoting Albert Einstein, “as if there are no miracles or as if everything is a miracle.” Now, some might consider Sunday’s renewal of vows and Monday’s eclipse gathering as nice events but nothing miraculous. I, however, see God’s hand in them both.

And that, I think, is one of the great gifts of being a part of church, in general, and St. Luke’s in particular—because of my time with you, I have the eyes to see God’s hand at work in the world; I have the faith to believe in miracles.

Long and enduring marriages are a holy and miraculous thing, I believe. They require forgiveness and grace and love. They require that we look upon our spouses, knowing their faults and weaknesses, and yet still call them “my beloved.” That’s not just what God did two thousand years ago, looking upon Jesus. That’s how God lives in us and through us even today. That’s how God invites us to participate in the little miracles of now.

Similarly, strangers and friends coming together, sharing conversation and joys and wonder, that too is a holy thing. God knows (truly), and so do we, that friends and strangers can come together for hateful reasons leading to horrific results. The eclipse viewing was a timely reminder that by the grace of God, such gatherings might have very different results as well.

Some of you have been away from church these summer weeks, enjoying extra time of rest and recreation. I hope your time has been good— blessed with at least a few tiny miracles. Others of you have been around, enjoying the fellowship and Eucharist we share each Sunday. I hope you too have found that time good, rich with its own gracious and miraculous moments.

As September arrives, I look forward to us coming together weekly, in fullness of body and faith, to worship, to sing, to pray, to learn, to serve, to weep, to celebrate, to wonder.

And as we do so, may we all have the eyes to see God's light. May we all have the faith to believe in God's miracles. May we all walk away each Sunday thinking, "I am so glad we came out!"

Curate's Corner ~ Comments from Fr. Dante

Good Lord, deliver us . . .

As of late it seems that every morning as I read the paper and scan the internet to see what is going on in the world I find myself repeating the phrase, “Good Lord, deliver us.” But that sigh – that plea to God – reached a new depth as I watched the events in Charlottesville, VA unfold.

As I read article after article, as I watched news clip after news clip, I could not help but feel the weight of helplessness on my shoulders. What could I, a curate in Rhode Island, do to help? Through prayer, conversation, reading, and discernment it became clear that there are three things I – and we all – can do to make a difference.

First, we must boldly rebuke the sins of racism, bigotry, and white supremacy that are intensifying with renewed vigor in our society. Doing this is not just about standing up for political justice, it is a way to fulfill the promises made at our Baptism. The very first vows taken in the Baptismal Service are to “renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God,” and to “renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God” (Book of Common Prayer, 302). What we are witnessing is nothing less than the work of Satan, the spiritual forces of wickedness, and the power of evil in our world. This exploding level of racism is not only bad and wrong – it is evil and sinful. Therefore, by virtue of our Baptism, we are called to renounce it.

Second, we must educate ourselves. It is important for us to learn and begin to understand (at least intellectually) the full depth and painful reality of racism in our world. There are really great resources out there, and I am more than happy to share those sources with any who are interested.

Finally, we are called to pray. This might be one of the most important things that we as Christians can do. As followers of Jesus we are first and foremost people of prayer. As Episcopalians and Anglicans we believe that prayer is powerful and has the ability to transform lives and the world. Our prayer shapes and forms the way we believe and empowers us to go out and make those beliefs reality. There are amazing resources for prayer that we can turn to, but there is one in particular I would like to highlight.

Over the last several months, I have made a regular practice of praying The Great Litany every Friday. The Great Litany is one of the oldest prayers we have in the *Book of Common Prayer*. Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Cranmer wrote it in 1544 (five

years before the first Book of Common Prayer). Cranmer composed this prayer with the intention that it would be said or sung in procession, particularly in times of division, conflict, fear, and natural disaster. It seems to me, that today our country finds itself in a time of division, conflict, and fear.

In The Great Litany we pray “Good Lord, deliver us” from all evil and sin: “from blindness of heart,” “from contempt of [God’s] Word and commandment,” and “from all oppression, conspiracy, and rebellion; from violence, battle, and murder.” We pray that God will illumine are hearts and minds to live in accordance with the will of God; we pray that God will strengthen us with God’s grace and truth; we pray that all who hold positions of power and authority will “do justice, and love mercy” (BCP, p. 149-150).

In the weeks and months ahead I am going to continue my practice of praying The Great Litany and I invite you to join me. Every Friday at 4pm, beginning September 8, I will be in the church to pray The Great Litany. I invite you to join me in praying these centuries old prayers, surrounded by the beauty of our church, trusting that these prayers will someday transform the way I live, the way we live, and the way the world lives.

If you cannot join me here I church, I invite you to pray the litany on your own. You can find it on page 148 of the *Book of Common Prayer*. If the litany does not inspire you, I would be delighted to help find other resources for you to use.

In these times of division and conflict we are called to gather together and pray. No matter what form you use, may we all join together turning our hearts and minds to the knowledge and love of God - the God who is the lover of justice and the lover of our souls.

Path to Peace: The Episcopal Youth Event 2017

“Every three years, in accordance with General Convention Resolution #1982-D079, the Episcopal Church convenes an international youth event so ‘that the energy of the youth of the Episcopal Church can continue to be utilized in active ministry as members of the Body of Christ.’” These words explain what the Episcopal Youth Event is, but not why it is so important.

Every three years high school students from The Episcopal Church around the world come together to worship, learn, work, and play together. It is an amazing experience and gift to participants that will continue to enrich their lives long after they return home (just ask our curate Dante, who attend EYE 2005). This past summer two of our young people, Katrina Marek and Sabastian Borgia, attended EYE 2017 in Oklahoma City. Here’s what Katrina had to say about her experience:

“Attending the Episcopal Youth Event is an indescribable experience that I have been lucky enough to attend twice, most recently this past July when the event was located at the University of Central Oklahoma in Edmond, Oklahoma. The moment we arrived on campus we were greeted by friendly faces at every turn. While most everyone there must have been tired from the journey, soon we were all infected with excitement and joy.

One of the most beautiful things about EYE is that everyone is there to explore their relationship with God and with the Episcopalian community. This makes even the shyest people as friendly and outgoing as ever. My first EYE experience is one of the many things that has taught me to come out of my shell and be a more outgoing person. It’s custom to stop anyone you see, introduce yourself, say where you are from, and exchange whatever trinkets you’ve brought from your diocese. By the end of the week, everyone is being weighed down by their bags and nametags because they’re covered in pins, stickers, bracelets, and more.

I’ve also made some amazing friends from EYE just from sharing experiences together. The most popular time to make friends is on the third day when everyone goes on a field trip to a nearby city. This year we visited Oklahoma City, travelling around to different museums, a horse show, and the Oklahoma City bombing memorial. To transport the 1500 people attending the event, we were all put onto several buses, allowing us to get to know people at the camp on a smaller scale. It’s incredible to see how close people can become in just a few short days.

The services at EYE are something you have to see to believe. They are filled with nothing but praise, singing at the top of your lungs, dancing, conga lines, and pure joy. The words said during the Eucharist have a new meaning when you are surrounded by so many people. The music, whether loud or soft, fast or slow, is vibrant and fills the entire space. Just attending one of these services will teach you what it really means to love God, love your neighbor, and love yourself.

EYE is an experience unlike any other. In only a few days you have the ability to meet hundreds of people who all share one belief, and that single connection is so strong that it has the ability to create friendships that last a lifetime. It also helps young adults better understand their faith and what God means to them. Everyone should attend EYE, whether as a youth or an adult, because it will teach you new ways to practice faith and spread the good news of Jesus.”





Try the train - it's free RIDOT Free Commuter Rail

Free In-State Commuter Rail Service July 3 - December 29, 2017



The Rhode Island Department of Transportation (RIDOT) is encouraging Rhode Islanders to leave their cars at home for the daily trip to work, to catch a flight, or to visit the capital city by making in-state travel free on trains between Wickford Junction, T.F. Green and Providence stations.

RIDOT is making commuter rail service free from July 3 to the end of the year to raise awareness about this convenient transit service. RIDOT hopes it will also help people decide to make the train a way of life which will relieve them of the burden of parking in the city. More transit riders also mean less congestion on the busy Route 4 highway and in downtown Providence.

"Rhode Island ranks on the bottom when it comes to the percentage of travelers who use transit as opposed to cars, yet we have the infrastructure and train service to make it easy for people to get around our state without a car," RIDOT Director Peter Alviti Jr. said, "Making it free for a period of time will make more people aware of this great service and provide them an opportunity to try it and use it on a regular basis."

Parking at Wickford Junction Station is free year-round. The facility - located minutes from Exit 5 on Route 4 in North Kingstown - includes covered garage parking, restrooms, a climate-controlled indoor waiting area, electric car charging stations and vending machines.
