# From Father Tim

When I was searching for my first position as rector (now more years ago than I care to imagine!), I had the good fortune of being a finalist in two places. The first was in my sponsoring diocese of Washington, D.C. I remember being so excited by the prospects of returning home, of ministry in a diverse urban setting, and of serving a church a stone's throw from the Capitol. On paper, this church seemed like a perfect fit in every way.

The second was a church in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. I had to go to the map to even locate Portsmouth. They were searching for a priest who already had been a rector for at least seven years. I had been ordained only three. Their two previous rectors, spanning nearly forty years, had come from England. I had never even travelled to England. And they were looking for a priest who loved the history and tradition of the Episcopal Church. I had been an Episcopalian for a mere ten years. On paper, this place seemed as unlikely a landing spot for me as I could imagine.

Then I interviewed at both sites, and my sense of call could not have been clearer or more profound. I was bound for New Hampshire.

I knew from the moment I stepped foot in St. John's, there was just something different about the place. There was no pretentiousness. There was a deep love for what the church had been, but also a wonderful openness for what the church might be. And there was an ability to laugh that felt as warm and inviting as the cool breeze that blew off the near-by water. I left there thinking, "This place is special, maybe even unique."

The day after I returned home from my interview, I withdrew from the process in Washington.

From what I know now, clergy are lucky if they have such an experience once in their lifetime. Oh, they might find any number of churches that are perfectly fine. But truly different, maybe even unique—that's a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

Miraculously, amazingly, I have had that experience <u>twice</u>. Once with St. John's, and now a second time, as I have come to be with all of you.

Like the process with St. John's, I had the good fortune of being a finalist in two churches when Diane and I interviewed at St. Luke's. And again, after spending just a few days with the search committee, it was immediately apparent that St. Luke's was something different.

I'll not draw detailed comparisons in this instance, as the other parish (for which I have great respect) is also a part of the Diocese of Rhode Island. But the point I want to make here is that, at least to my experience, there really is something rare and different about St. Luke's. My conversations with you all, including just today with Ruth Batchelor, suggest that I am not alone in my thinking: it seems many of you find St. Luke's to be different as well.

On October 14, we will begin our 2019 Commitment Campaign. While these campaigns are hard work, I also find them invigorating. Each year I invariably learn something new about St. Luke's and about each of you, too.

To kick off our campaign, we will worship again in the parish hall. Like last year, you will find banners hanging from the rafters which celebrate St. Luke's and speak to the themes of our campaign. I am so excited for you to see what the Walsh Brothers have created!

Also like last year, the sermon on the 14<sup>th</sup> will be a time for us to reflect on a few crucial questions regarding our corporate life. In anticipation of this day, let me offer you this question for consideration: Based upon your experience, what makes St. Luke's a unique community and church?

I expect many of you will have different perspectives and insights, while a number of you might have some similar thoughts. I look forward to hearing them all!

I will tell you now, one of the things I find so wonderfully different about St. Luke's is that you all speak up no matter what crazy question I throw your way. It is for this reason and many others that I feel blessed to share church with you.

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# Curate's Corner Thoughts from Fr. Dante

Whan that aprill with his shoures soote / The droghte of march hath perced to the roote, / And bathed every veyne in swich licour / Of which vertu engendred is the flour; / Whan zephirus eek with his sweete breeth / Inspired hath in every holt and heath / Tendre croppes, and the yonge sonne / Hath in the ram his halve cours yronne, / And smale foweles maken melodye, / That slepen al the nyght with open ye / (so priketh hem nature in hir corages); / And palmeres for to seken straunge strondes, / To ferne halwes, kowthe in sondry londes; / And specially from every shires ende / Of engelond to caunterbury they wende, / The hooly blisful martir for to seke, / That hem hath holpen whan that they were seeke.

For nearly 1000 years Christians have journeyed from all over the world to what was once called the chief shrine in Christendom after Rome. This Pilgrims' Way was so important and prominent in the cultural mind of England that Geoffrey Chaucer, in the late fourteenth century, wrote the classic – now required reading for every high school student – *The Canterbury Tales*, the story of a band of pilgrims making their way across England to arrive at Canterbury Cathedral to visit the Shrine of St. Thomas Becket. While the Becket shrine was destroyed in 1538 by order of King Henry VIII, Canterbury Cathedral is still one of the most important places of pilgrimages for Christians around the world. This spring, we have the opportunity the join this faithful lineage.

As Episcopalians and Anglicans our heritages and roots are easily traceable back to the Church of England. Thus the history of the Church of England is our history too. This pilgrimage will give us the opportunity to travel back in time, to trace the footsteps of our Anglican ancestors, to learn of the living history of our inherited faith, and to immerse ourselves into the beauty, sacredness, and full breath of the worship life of the Anglican tradition.

Partnering with an organization called Wonder Voyage (a company that specializes in religious pilgrimages) we have an amazing – or at least I think amazing – 7 day pilgrimage planned. Departing on Wednesday April 24, we will travel to Canterbury and spend three days in that Medieval city exploring, praying, and learning together. While in Canterbury we will explore and learn about the living history of the cathedral, visit the monastic ruins of St. Augustine's Abbey, and even spend time in the oldest, continuously operated, English speaking church in the world – St. Martin's Church, which dates back to the 400s! From Canterbury we will set off 3 to Salisbury.

Salisbury Cathedral is home to Britain's tallest spire and best preserved Magna Carta is also just 8 miles from Stonehenge. The importance of Salisbury Cathedral in the liturgical development of the Church of England, in my humble estimation, cannot be overstated. While in Salisbury we will be in residence at a local monastic retreat center where we will be afforded the gift of slowing down for a bit, of entering into the joy and simplicity of monastic life.

Finally we will spend our final night in London. We will have a brief period of time to explore that amazing city and offer a concluding ceremony of thanks and celebration for what promises to be a stunning pilgrimage.

Over the years I have made two pilgrimages to Canterbury, spent an afternoon in Salisbury, and for a year considered London a second home. Having experienced our three destinations I can promise you one thing about this pilgrimage: if you come with an open heart, an open mind, and an open ear to God you will have a profound, and maybe even transformative, experience.

If you are interested in learning more about this pilgrimage please let me know as soon as possible. I hope you will join me as we journey The Pilgrims' Way.
