

A Service in the Style of Taizé

Taizé is a tiny village hidden away in the hills of Burgundy, in the eastern part of France not far from the town of Cluny. Since 1940 it has been the home of an ecumenical monastic community of monks whose contemplative prayer is at the center of their life. Today, Taizé is a place to which visitors of all ages and backgrounds come on pilgrimage, to participate in international meetings of prayer and meditation. Taizé services have become increasingly popular in America.

In recent years, the style of music at Taize's services has evolved into one which uses short musical phrases with simple melodic units that can be readily memorized by anyone.

The service, as generally practiced at Taizé, has been adapted to include an experience of scriptural based silent prayer, Lectio Divina, which can serve as an introduction to the contemplative dimension of the gospel and contemplative prayer. The services are both quiet and contemplative and also joyous and exuberant, combining interior prayer with worship. Prayers, psalms, readings and silence alternate with congregational song. In "Taizé," the music is the province of the people, not the choir. Please join in.


Our Darkness La Ténèbre



PSALM 22:1-11

- My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? * and are so far from my cry and from the words of my distress?
- O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you do not answer; * by night as well, but I find no rest.
- 3 Yet you are the Holy One, * enthroned upon the praises of Israel.
- Our forefathers put their trust in you; * they trusted, and you delivered them.
- 5 They cried out to you and were delivered; * they trusted in you and were not put to shame.
- 6 But as for me, I am a worm and no man, * scorned by all and despised by the people.
- 7 All who see me laugh me to scorn; * they curl their lips and wag their heads, saying,
- 8 "He trusted in the LORD; let him deliver him; " let him rescue him, if he delights in him."
- 9 Yet you are he who took me out of the womb, * and kept me safe upon my mother's breast.
- I have been entrusted to you ever since I was born; *




Lectio Divina

The passage is read three times. Each reading is followed by silent intervals of four minutes, to facilitate the experience of the four senses of scripture: Lectio (reading), Meditatio (reflecting), Oratio (spontaneous prayer), and Contemplatio (resting in God).

When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, 'Woman, here is your son.' Then he said to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.' And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home. After this, when Jesus knew that all was now finished, he said (in order to fulfil the scripture), 'I am thirsty.' A jar full of sour wine was standing there. So they put a sponge full of the wine on a branch of hyssop and held it to his mouth. When Jesus had received the wine, he said, 'It is finished.' Then he bowed his head and gave up his spirit. (John 19:26-30)

Invocation of the Spirit




During the singing of the chant, the following verses are sung:

Come from the four winds, O Spirit, come breath of God; disperse the shadows over us, renew and strengthen your people. Savior of the poor, come to our poverty. Shower upon us the seven gifts of your grace. Be the light of our lives. O come. You are our only comforter, Peace of the soul. In the heat you shade us; in our labor you refresh us, and in trouble you are our strength. Kindle in our hearts the flame of your love that in the darkness of the world it may glow and reach to all for ever.

Prayers & Intercessions

The refrain alternates with petitions sung by a cantor or spoken by members of the congregation. The congregation is invited to offer petitions out loud in between refrains. The return to the refrain is announced by two bell tones.


