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## Greetings!

Time has come for me to leave. I am very sad to leave such a "growing" place as St. Luke's. I want you to know that the Love I have felt at St. Luke's will be ever present in my ministry. I have been in a community of friends, people who care deeply about each other, and through our virtual worship, I've experienced friends that pray deeply together. I can hear "prayer" in your readings, and a call to action in our discussion on the book -Virus as a Summons to Faith, by Brueggeman. The coronavirus has turned our world upside-down, we have lost our daily routines that comfort us. We are concerned about what this virus will mean for our futures: for our jobs, our social lives, our organizations, our churches, and our happiness. Our study was how to see God's **power** within the pandemic. How do we invite God in to hear us, how do we trust God and promise our faithfulness? We are summoned to be Christians in a time of fear. The stories of the Hebrew Bible help us understand that God is compassionate and will be with us through these uncertain times.

My first Sunday at St. Luke's was 9-4-16, and I am leaving 4 years later! I asked Tim if I could preach on my first day, since one of my favorite letters from St. Paul was part of the lectionary. My fascination with St. Paul and Philemon was that Paul asks for forgiveness from a master to a runaway slave, a hard "ask" but that is God's call to us today, to live in the world, caring for each other. Adjusting to a lifestyle that means we think of others, when we put our mask on! **We care for each.** The lifetransforming message of Love that Paul puts forward has the same power to transform relationships in our lives. How we treat one another, our family, friends, enemies, and the church. Our lives are different because we are Christians.

I knew when I started ministry at St. Luke's it

was a very special family I was joining. We are a community that has fun together, we work hard together, and we stretch the limits to extend the Jesus Gospel in many ways! I love the family that I have been a part of, and I am sure you know by now - that Deacon ministry is about encouraging us to act out our Christian Faith. Our Christ like intention is to act and be as Christ in the world of today. I have been a recurring "asker" about giving to the homeless, supporting immigrant kids with school supplies and healing a forgotten day care in Puerto Rico and many more drives from soup to shower items! These efforts to support people in need could not happen without you, and they are a part of the St. Luke's family. I encourage you to forge ahead!! Intention arises from the heart -it's the way we live with a Christ Mind. At the end of every service I say..."Go in peace to Love and Serve the Lord" As a Deacon I send you, we know the Celebration of the Eucharist has ended, & now our service begins. I say "Serve on"!!!

I want to thank each person in our parish for saying YES to the ask for help, for serving, for caring and being part of the giving faith community at St. Luke's. I have seen the love of Jesus in you, and am sad to be leaving so many friends! GodSpeed!

## The next book study to be So You Want to Talk About Race By Ijeoma Oluo

One of the powerful takeaways from our recently completed book study of *Virus: A Summons to Faith* was the observation by many that the concurrence of the pandemic with the violent deaths of George Floyd and several other African Americans has allowed

us a particular opportunity for deep reflections on matters related to race. As one parishioner noted to me, "I don't know if this country would be having such a sustained conversation on race if everything else was humming along as usual."

I believe she's right. This is not a normal summer. We are not off on vacation. We are not hosting visitors who like to come to Rhode Island's beaches. We are not even going to the theater for some summer blockbuster release. It feels like this is a particular moment in time. In fact, I would go so far as to suggest this is what Christian scholars refer to as a "kairos moment."

Have you ever heard that phrase before?

One author described a **kairos moment** in this way: it is "a moment of maximum opportunity. It is a moment when change is possible. It is an exquisite syncretistic moment when all things 'come together' and align. I believe it is what the Bible refers to as 'the set time,' and what we in the church call, 'waiting for God's *best*.'"

So sensing the energy and urgency of this moment, I invite you to join me and the Adult Faith Formation Committee in reading, *So You Want to Talk About Race*, by Ijeoma Oluo. We have selected this particular book amongst a variety of possibilities because it provides such a rich, accessible, and personal examination of race in America.

The study will begin Wednesday, August 5. Classes will gather by way of Zoom, going from 7:00-8:30PM. To purchase a book, either look in your local bookstore or purchase on line through Amazon.

I hope you'll join us for this important read. Although reading a book doesn't guarantee a deeper understanding of race-related issues, listening to the stories of one African American woman surely seems like a good place to start.

#### From The Treasurer

#### A Note From The Treasurer

Since mid-March, when the coronavirus shut down our Church, my job changed quite a bit from the norm I knew.

Without a Sunday service, we had no collections to process, so the counters who would meet every Monday have stayed home - minimizing personal interactions is a major weapon in fighting this disease. Christina, our Parish Administrator, was also asked to work from home for the first six weeks or so - there really was no need to risk having her come to the office when the building was locked down.

So for that time frame, I would check the mail daily and once a week, gather the checks and pledges and deposit them in the bank. Lisa, our Bookkeeper, continued coming in on Wednesdays, and the finances went on.

In early April, we applied for the Payroll Protection Program loans, and received one for \$55,000 in early May. This represents 2 months payroll, so we fully expect that it will qualify for forgiveness when we file.

In May, the Finance Committee recommended a revised budget which the Vestry passed in

June, reflecting both reduced income and expenses. The basis for that is as follows:

- \* Income highlights
  - o Minus \$20,000 in loose plate
  - o Minus \$2,700 Designated gifts (Flower and Music memorials from Easter)
  - o Minus \$15,000 Dante fund (he left 2 months earlier than we budgeted)
  - o Minus \$30,000 Current Year Pledge
  - o Minus \$9,000 in fundraising (no yard sale or memorial bricks)
  - o **Minus** \$5,800 for the new assistant starting 1 month later than originally budgeted
  - o Minus \$12,500 in rental income
  - o **Added** \$20,000 in DIT income (recommendation from the Diocese that we use all the DIT income this year for operations)
  - o Added \$55,000 from the PPP loan
  - o Net result is total income reduced by \$20,947 for the rest of the year

### \* Expenses

- o Minus \$18,229 (the 3 months of no assistant onboard)
- o Minus \$11,500 in Facilities (\$8,000 in utilities, the rest spread out)
- o **Minus** \$1,950 small adjustments to most programs and an addition of \$4.500 to digital evangelism for the online worshipping costs
- o Net result is expenses lowered by \$34,179
- \* Bottom line shows a shortfall of \$18,052

From day one of these extraordinary times, you, the parishioners of St. Luke's, have continued to show your support and love for our community. The pledge checks have continued to come in, often accompanied by supportive notes and words of thankfulness. I know I speak for the entire leadership team when I say that your commitment, faithfulness and optimism are extremely appreciated! It makes all the work we do worth all the effort!
