Greetings!

I'm a bit of a weather geek. Joseph calls me "Doppler boy". Have you ever used one of those radar apps on your phone or computer where you can toggle between "past" and "future" radar animation? I love those. Well consider this newsletter the first half of the St. Luke's "weather report". I will be reviewing our recent past, and next week Father Tim will take a look at our future. Six months into this pandemic, and on the threshold of a new fall season, it seems like an appropriate time to pause and take measure.

Six months since we have had anything close to business as usual at St. Luke's. In some ways agonizingly long as we endure significant disruption at best and difficult hardship at worst. Yet at the same time it is hard to believe it has been half a year of altered reality, as the clock has stopped us in an endless holding pattern. But while it has not been business as usual at St. Luke's, we have adapted and continued on with business most unusual. We have built upon our existing paths of connection and found new and different paths. New and diverse ways that have bound us as strongly as ever as a church family.

Our biggest reconnection, as you all know, has been the resumption of Sunday worship services at church! How wonderful it has been to see one another, to worship in our beautiful sanctuary and auditorium, and to hear the wonderful words and music of our liturgy. But it has been different, hasn't it? We've traded in twodimensional images of our faces and garbled Zoom voices for partially covered faces and voices muffled by masks. We still long for the beautiful sound of our full choir. We miss that sacred approach to the communion rail that so powerfully symbolizes our coming before God. We miss the fellowship of coffee hour in the atrium, the warm touch, the healing hug. And we lament the fact that we are not yet fully a congregation reunited as we feel the absence of many who cannot yet safely return to our sides.

But we've forged new paths to compensate. Weekly virtual services are routine. And quite good, would you not agree? The warm messages of welcome from Father Tim. Rodney's nurturing organ and piano music played while the camera pans around our lovely sanctuary (ahem ... not too unlike the times when my gaze wanders in church). The uplifting soloist performances. The comforting repetition of the Morning Prayer liturgy. And of course some of the best preaching you will find anywhere - reaching into our hearts and souls in a way that I sometimes feel is even more direct and immediate than when heard across rows of pews. One of the recommended coping mechanisms for getting through this pandemic is to establish new routines. Watching St. Luke's virtual worship on YouTube at the same time and in the same space each Sunday morning has been a huge anchor for Joseph and me during these troubling times.

It is a happy predicament I am faced with to be running out of article space to recount all the ways we are continuing to be a church at St. Luke's. I listed many of them back in my May newsletter, but they bear some repeating. We regularly meet every other Sunday on Zoom for virtual social hour (moved to evenings to accommodate those attending morning services at church). We continue to learn and grow together through our Zoom Adult Faith Formation classes on Wednesday nights. (By the way, if you think Father Tim's preaching is great, you really need to come check out his moderating skills as he guides us through some fantastic conversations). Our property committee continues to keep our grounds looking great. We took a big gulp and completed the last of our campus roof repairs, knowing that we must keep up with the maintenance of our buildings -- even in these uncertain financial times. Our committees continue to meet, plan and manage. Our staff continues to keep the office running and our building clean. We've said a sad goodbye to our Curate and Deacon and hello to our new Assistant Rector. Thanks to the hard work of so many and the generosity of even more, we finally were able to hold the golf tournament to raise funds for the kitchen renovation. We are so nearly close to our fundraising goal and are poised to recommence the kitchen design and construction process. And in countless ways that none of us have a full view of, we are staying connected with one another, offering support and simple friendship, and looking out for those we know just need an extra phone call or word of encouragement.

I'm sure I've left out many noteworthy past and current conditions in this St. Luke's weather report. But the picture is clear -- we are still here and we are still functioning as Christ's church. And whether you participate in person or virtually, frequently or on occasion -- St. Luke's is your church. Together we are St. Luke's. Whether in person, on the internet, or in common prayer, we are the gathered Body of Christ. In times of turbulence or calm, we are gathered and bound together in God's love. And the forecast is always the same, in hard times and easy times -- community, perseverance, and a hope that does not disappoint.

Adult Faith Formation

The next book study to be So You Want to Talk About Race By Ijeoma Oluo

One of the powerful takeaways from our recently completed book study of *Virus: A Summons to Faith* was the observation by many that the concurrence of the pandemic with the violent deaths of George Floyd and several other African Americans has allowed us a particular opportunity for deep reflections on matters related to race. As one parishioner noted to me, "I don't know if this country would be having such a sustained conversation on race if everything else was humming along as usual."

I believe she's right. This is not a normal summer. We are not off on vacation. We are not hosting visitors who like to come to Rhode Island's beaches. We are not even going to the theater for some summer blockbuster release. It feels like this is a particular moment in time. In fact, I would go so far as to suggest this is what Christian scholars refer to as a "kairos moment."

Have you ever heard that phrase before?

One author described a **kairos moment** in this way: it is **"a moment of maximum opportunity.** It is **a moment when change is possible.** It is **an exquisite syncretistic moment when all things 'come together' and align.** I believe it is what the Bible refers to as 'the set time,' and what we in the church call, 'waiting for God's *best*.'"

So sensing the energy and urgency of this moment, I invite you to join me and the Adult Faith Formation Committee in reading, *So You Want to Talk About Race*, by Ijeoma Oluo. We have selected this particular book amongst a variety of possibilities because it provides such a rich, accessible, and personal examination of race in America.

Classes will gather by way of Zoom Wednesdays, going from 7:00-8:30PM. To purchase a book, either look in your local bookstore or purchase on line through Amazon.

I hope you'll join us for this important read. Although reading a book doesn't guarantee a deeper understanding of race-related issues, listening to the stories of one African American woman surely seems like a good place to start.
