### Greetings!

I am <u>not</u> a morning person. But on Sunday mornings I wake up at 5:40, which I am glad to share with anyone who will listen, because it is truly a mark of the grace of God in my life that I am *ever* able to get up that early. I stumble around and get ready, then head out across the Newport and Jamestown Bridges and up Route 4, arriving at St. Luke's ahead of our 7:45 service. My commute is almost 23 miles each way, which was a revelation to me. 23 miles sounds like a long haul, but it has been the most stunning, glorious drive, especially the last couple of months.

Autumn has been my favorite season since I was a little girl. Living in Phoenix, I desperately missed the changing seasons. Our first year there, my husband took me away up to the north of the state so that I could see the "changing colors" in Sedona and Flagstaff. It was nice to get away and out of the persistent heat, but it wasn't a truly autumnal experience. Tim grew up in Idaho, and his sense of fall was when the aspen groves turned yellow, which is truly beautiful, but not really...captivating. I always longed for that rhythmic pattern of seasonal change, the beauty of the earth put on magnificent display in the hushed tones of spring, the brilliance of summer, the glittering winter, and especially the fiery shades of fall.

Every Sunday morning, I pull out of my driveway and turn down quiet streets as I make my way to the Newport Bridge. The view from the bridge is stunning. Sometimes the water is choppy and churning, sometimes it is glittering and inviting. Boats often dot the bay. From the top of the bridge, the scene unfolds like a tapestry. I can't believe I get to live here and see this view every time I leave Aquidneck Island. Last Sunday, the sun was rising as I left our house. The sky turned brilliant shades of blue, orange, and gray; the water looked almost purple against it, recalling Homer's reference to a wine-dark sea. As I journeyed on, I could not help but think of the generations of people who have seen these wonders, though they are brand new to me. Though my experiences are unique, they are also shared across generations. I was surprised to recognize the gray waters of the stormy sea a few weeks ago; I knew them from artists' renderings that are at least a hundred years old. Our experiences are shared across the ages.

As Christians, we are also bound together across time and space. In different languages, with different styles of worship, Christians the world over celebrate the unending hope that emerges from the knowledge of our resurrected Lord. There are Christians who, across two thousand years, have sought to live faithfully, loving God and loving their neighbor. Our faith is part of their legacy. We know the path because they have walked it. I knew the stormy sea before I saw it for myself because of the witness of the artists who were here before me; we know the love of God and the story of a light that darkness cannot overcome because of the saints who attest to it across the generations.

This Sunday, I will rise at 5:40 and stumble around to get ready for church. I will drive 23 miles to celebrate All Saints Day with the saints of St. Luke's. I will drive across the bridges, knowing that generations before me have driven these roads and generations after me will also. I will give thanks to God for the grandeur of creation, for the sea, for the sky, for the red and golden leaves that linger. I will give thanks for the light of Christ that has illuminated our path, and I will give thanks for those who have walked that path before us and those who will continue on the path after our time on earth is finished. This life is an incredible gift, and I'm so glad to share this season of life with you.


During this difficult time, all of us have had to find alternative ways to make our resources go further. St. Luke's Church is no different!

2020 has been a challenging year in more ways than we care to think about. It is certainly *not* the New Year we dreamed of or expected to see as we raised a toast at midnight on 12/31/2019.

Since the pandemic hit, we have shared results as we went along, ever thankful for the support the members of St. Luke's were able to provide. Our cash flow was sufficient for us to pay the bills without drawing down our endowments.

But the pandemic has hurt us, as you can see from the chart above - income is down across the board. And while we were able to curb some spending and bring in money from the PPP program, we will still face a shortfall (currently projected at \$20,000) at year end, and an uncertain financial picture going forward in 2021.

If you are behind in your pledge, and can catch up in the fourth quarter, it would help us. We know some can't - layoffs and furloughs didn't pass over our congregation. If you are able to provide support, please do.

St. Luke's means many things to our parishioners - I'm sure we all can provide a different story on what we derive from it.

But again, I and the rest of the leadership team are so grateful for all you give and do for our Parish!

# Adult Faith Formation

AFF is offering a study of Jim Wallis' *Christ in Crisis? Reclaiming Jesus in a Time of Fear, Hate, and Violence*. About this book it was written:

In *Christ in Crisis* Jim Wallis provides a path of spiritual healing and solidarity to help us heal the divide separating Americans today. Building on "Reclaiming Jesus"-the declaration he and other church leaders wrote in May 2018 to address America's current crisis-Wallis argues that Christians have become disconnected from Jesus and need to revisit their spiritual foundations. By pointing to eight questions Jesus asked or is asked, Wallis provides a means to measure whether we are truly aligned with the moral and spiritual foundations of our Christian faith.

"Christians have often remembered, re-discovered, and returned to their obedient discipleship of Jesus Christ-both personal and public-in times of trouble. It's called coming home," Wallis reminds us. While he addresses the dividing lines and dangers facing our nation, the religious and

cultural commentator's focus isn't politics; it's faith. As he has done throughout his career, Wallis offers comfort, empathy, and a practical roadmap.

### Women of Grace and The Virus Unmasked!

Please join the Women of Grace on **Monday**, **November 2**, to discuss the science and latest research on the coronavirus. Dr. Deborah Britt, St. Luke's own microbiologist and Assistant Professor of Biology at Rhode Island College, will lead the discussion. She summarizes her upcoming remarks as follows:

**Covid-19**: the disease has upended our lives, there's news about it every day, but the deluge of information can be confusing and contradictory. Let's talk about the novel coronavirus, and explore how scientific research 'unmasks' details of the virus and disease transmission. We'll look at the outbreak in a church choir practice early in the pandemic, and consider the importance of current testing and safety measures for our own faith community, and

communities at large.

Women of Grace meets once a month via Zoom. Each gathering begins with a period of fellowship, followed by the evening's discussion, and ends with a prayer or reflection.
