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Greetings!

While 2020 is behind us, it will undoubtedly inform our vision forward as St. Luke's approaches its 186th Annual Meeting. As we review our accomplishments over the last year and set the course for new leadership, programs, and our collective work together, we take this moment to reflect upon the lessons learned, the losses shared, the changes introduced into every aspect of our lives, and the hope, love and support we brought to bear on it all. As so oft repeated, never more have we needed each other and never more has St. Luke's needed all of us.

As you will learn at the annual meeting, a few more changes are ahead. Our vestry will shift its membership with some members rotating off and new members joining the team. Three of us will be part of this shift. Joel Gardner and Deborah Collins completed three-year terms and Dana Borgia a one-year term, finishing out Bill Warburton's term when he took on Junior Warden responsibilities in 2020. The context of 'before 2020' and 'during 2020' as well as our various orientations to St. Luke's lend different perspectives on how each of us experienced our vestry service. Perhaps you can identify with some of what we share with you now.

Deborah -- Yes, it's a monthly meeting, with an agenda, discussions, decisions, some follow up tasks and plans. But, what I remember, what has moved me most, is the pervasive faith and depth of spirituality that each person brings to the table. True to our Episcopalian nature, each vestry member has a unique, personal faith journey, affording a roomy space within which we were able to explore, grow, and connect spiritually. The devotions we all tried to avoid leading, but eventually relished, shared intimate family stories, a variety of inspiring resources from Mr. Rogers to Robert Frost to A Quaker Book of Wisdom, musical backdrops from country to rock n' roll, and creative arrangements of interactive prayers and reflections. Our vestry retreats

before 2020 took us to ECC for two days of fellowship, eating, praying, laughing, planning, relaxing and bonding-a lot like summer camp but with more Jesus! Despite the 2020 trifecta of pandemic, racial tension and politics, and the ensuing changes we never could have anticipated, faith prevailed. What a blessing to serve and to be fed by this deeply dedicated and loving community during these times.

Joel -- It has certainly been a privilege to serve this parish as a member of the vestry for the past three years. I think that we all agree that it has been an amazing growth experience, and we have gotten so much out of it. Led by the amazing Fr. Tim, our meetings are more like family gatherings than you would expect. We begin each meeting with prayer and reflection, and then give prayerful consideration to reports and decisions as we work to discern God's will for our great parish and to make it possible for this church to be in the best possible position to do God's work in the world.

I would like to express my admiration for the graceful leadership exhibited by our staff and wardens during this unusual year. Making plans for situations that sometimes changed daily had to be very challenging, but from the time that the pandemic first started last spring, they always found a way to keep the community connected, provide rich worship services, and keep us safe. They always came to the vestry with a solution, not just a problem to be solved. Like everyone, I long for the day when we can worship together as a parish family, when our choirs and formation groups can gather, and all of our outreach ministries resume as normal.

Dana -- What else can I add? My first meeting was held at St. Luke's and held promises to participate in a Vestry Retreat and a time to get to know each other, and left me ruminating about the devotion I volunteered to do the following month. From there it morphed into another Zoom meeting to have at home after a day full of Zoom meetings. The big difference being that on my little computer screen I was transported back to a place of such comfort and belonging for me, which I have sorely missed, that of my St. Luke's family. Vestry, in and of itself is such a great opportunity to collaborate with other members of the parish that you may know, may have "seen around" or are brand new to you, in order to keep the pillars and inner working of our spiritual sanctuary alive. I am always impressed by the rich fabric of parishioners and leadership that comprise our church community and it has been a privilege to have served in a small and humble way.

Food Cupboard - Volunteer Opportunity

Recently, due to the cold weather that comes along with the winter months as well as clients physical limitations, the food bank has received several requests for assistance in the delivery of their groceries. At this time this is not a service that is offered. If volunteers are available, we would like to try offering this assistance on limited basis to clients that cannot come in.

This assistance would consist of picking up the grocery order that has been pre-ordered and packed, based on a list provided by the client. When required you would receive a call requesting your assistance in delivering them to the client's home in East Greenwich or nearby. Typically, deliveries will be made once or twice a month. The Food Cupboard is open on Monday, Wed & Friday from 10:30am - 12:00am. Pickup would need to be made during these hours.
