THE LESSONS

A Reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah 40:21-31.

Have you not known? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth? It is he who sits above the circle of the earth, and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers; who stretches

out the heavens like a curtain, and spreads them like a tent to live in; who brings princes to naught, and makes the rulers of the earth as nothing. Scarcely are they planted, scarcely sown, scarcely has their stem taken root in the earth, when he blows upon them, and they wither, and the tempest carries them off like stubble. To whom then will you compare me, or who is my equal? says the Holy One. Lift up your eyes on high and see: Who created these? He who brings out their host and numbers them, calling them all by name; because he is great in strength, mighty in power, not one is missing. Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, "My way is hidden from the LORD, and my right is disregarded by my God"? Have you not known? Have you not heard? The LORD is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless. Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

A Reading from the First Epistle of Paul to the Corinthians 9:16-23.

If I proclaim the gospel, this gives me no ground for boasting, for an obligation is laid on me, and woe to me if I do not proclaim the gospel! For if I do this of my own will, I have a reward; but if not of my own will, I am entrusted with a commission. What then is my reward? Just this: that in my proclamation I may make the gospel free of charge, so as not to make full use of my rights in the gospel. For though I am free with respect to all, I have made myself a slave to all, so that I might win more of them. To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though I myself am not under the law) so that I might win those under the law. To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law) so that I might win those outside the law. To the weak I became weak, so that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that I might by all means save some. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, so that I may share in its blessings.

A Reading from the Gospel of Mark 1:29-39.

After Jesus and his disciples left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them. That evening, at sundown, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. And the whole city was gathered around the door. And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him. In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. And Simon and his companions hunted for him. When they found him, they said to him, "Everyone is searching for you." He answered, "Let us go on to the neighboring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also;

for that is what I came out to do.” And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.

Ash Wednesday

This year, **Ash Wednesday is February 17.** Though our church service for the day will be online, we will be offering multiple opportunities for you to receive the imposition of ashes. Ashes, made from the burning of the palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday, signify our mortality and our repentance. As the ashes are imposed, we are reminded that we are dust, and to dust we shall return. This life is not permanent, and Lent reminds us of the greater life to which we are all called. We will be outside at St. Luke's on Ash Wednesday from 7:30-8:30am, 12:00-1:00pm, and 5:30-6:30 to pray with you and impose ashes. Receiving ashes will only take a few minutes, and you are welcome to remain in your car if you would like. Receiving ashes does not require a priest, and this year we are also offering small kits with ashes that you can either pick up at the church beginning on February 11 or that we can mail to you. The kits will include a small bag with ashes that have been blessed and a prayer that you can say as you make the sign of the cross on your own forehead or on those who share your home with you. If you would like to receive the kit via mail, please contact the church office to let Christina know.

Adult Faith Formation

Our Lenten Adult Faith Formation series will be on our regular schedule, (Wednesday night at 7:00), beginning on Ash Wednesday.

We will be reading *Seven Last Words: An invitation to a deeper friendship with Jesus*, by Fr. James Martin. Even the titles of the chapters are a source of comfort: *Jesus Understands the Challenge of Forgiveness, Jesus Understands Doubts about the Afterlife, Jesus Understands a Parent's Love, Jesus Understands Feelings of Abandonment, Jesus Understands Physical Pain, Jesus Understands Disappointment, Jesus Understands Self-Offering*.
