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Greetings!

"Here we are in the name of Jesus! In the name above all names!" the woman declared. "We pray that you provide all of us with courage and strength to represent you," the man prayed. "God wins!" the sign read.

All of this sounds like good stuff, doesn't it? Sentiments we Christians can cheer. Except the woman announcing her arrival "in the name of Jesus" was livestreaming herself entering the Capitol along with other insurrectionists. And the man praying for "courage and strength to represent God" was a member of the Proud Boys, a white nationalist group, preparing to lead the attack. And the sign announcing "God wins" was being held by the now infamous shirtless, horn-wearing man who invaded the Senate chamber. So it turns out, not such a good moment for Christians after all.

I read all about these individuals in an article entitled, "Capitol violence brewed by nationalism, conspiracies, and Jesus." Lest you think this article was published by some anti-Christian rag, I assure you, it was not. Rather I came across it in the latest Christian Century magazine, a biweekly journal with the tag line, "Thinking Critically, Living Faithfully." Hard to complain about that.

Actually, I was not surprised to read any of what they reported. I had heard on the news much the same in the days following January 6th. And in truth, I had heard a similar suggestion from a number of my friends, none of whom, I hasten to add, know much about the Christian faith.

Now, I know and you know that the words and actions of those so-called Christians who stormed the Capitol could not differ more from the words and actions of the Jesus whom we follow. But sadly, there are many today who are unable to make such a distinction. Oh, they might not wonder if we were actually in the mob storming the steps, but they might wonder, even if to themselves, how or why we would describe ourselves as Christians when many of those climbing through the shattered Capitol windows identified themselves the same way.

Which speaks to a big, big problem we have. How do we signal to friends and strangers alike exactly what it means to us to be Christian?

Next week is Ash Wednesday, a day many of us will walk around with a mark that announces to all whom we see, "I am a Christian." And that day begins our long journey through Lent which, among many things, invites us to reflect upon just what kind of Christian we might be.

I do believe there has never been a more important time to make that announcement not just with conviction but with gentleness, kindness, and love. And as we hope to emerge come Easter from both chaos and COVID, there has never been a more meaningful Lent to reflect upon the very substance of our Christian life.

I hope you will join me in bearing the mark of the cross on Ash Wednesday. (Please see below for information regarding the many ways you might do so.) I hope you will join me in "... the observance of a holy Lent by self-examination and repentance." (BCP p. 265)

And I pray that the Christian witness we provide in the coming days will be illuminating to our friends and strangers, constructive for our country, and pleasing to our Lord and Maker.

This year, **Ash Wednesday is February 17**. Though our church service for the day will be online, we will be offering multiple opportunities for you to receive the imposition of ashes. Ashes, made from the burning of the palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday, signify our mortality and our repentance. As the ashes are imposed, we are reminded that we are dust, and to dust we shall return. This life is not permanent, and Lent reminds us of the greater life to which we are all called.

We will be outside at St. Luke's on Ash Wednesday from 7:30-8:30am, 12:00-1:00pm, and 5:30-6:30 to pray with you and impose ashes. Receiving ashes will only take a few minutes, and you are welcome to remain in your car if you would like. Receiving ashes does not require a priest, and this year we are also offering small kits with ashes that you can either pick up at the church beginning on February 11 or that we can mail to you. The kits will include a small bag with ashes that have been blessed and a prayer that you can say as you make the sign of the cross on your own forehead or on those who share your home with you. If you would like to receive the kit via mail, please contact the church office to let Christina know.

You can also make your own ash for imposition of ashes. While it would be wonderful to use palms from Palm Sunday for this, during this time of pandemic, ashes from other sources are okay too. You can also choose to simply mark the sign of the cross on your forehead without ashes. If you choose to make your own ashes, make sure that the time is prayerful for you and other members of your household. The Reverends Jennifer McNally & Anna V. Ostenso Moore suggest this prayer and questions for reflection: *Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth: May these ashes [or this action] be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.* When making the sign of the cross on your forehead, or the forehead of a family member, you can say, *Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return.* After the cross is marked, offer your own prayer to God. Is there anything you would like to let go of and place in God's hands? What does it mean to you to be claimed as God's own, in life and in life beyond life?
