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Greetings!

In one of our recent Thursday night Kid's Compline services, we read the passage in Genesis about Abraham and Sarah being chosen by God for covenantal relationship. "Covenant" is one of those words that doesn't really come up in our everyday conversation, so we talked together about what that word means. It's more than a promise. It's more than a one-way commitment. It's entering into a permanent commitment with one another. Covenantal relationship requires faithfulness from those involved. It is not about God promising that only good things will happen in our lives, but about God promising to always be with us, to be near to us, to hear us when we call out, to guide us when we turn our attention to God's faithful presence. We know that God is always faithful, but as human beings faithfulness is more difficult for us, so we rely on God's continuing mercy and forgiveness.

I used to think of mercy as a negative thing, something I had to beg for from a God that might withhold it from me. Then I learned that in ancient monastic communities, mercy was seen as a healing balm, something that poured out abundantly from God's very essence to heal those places in us that are wounded. Something shifted in me; instead of imagining myself crying out to a remote God for mercy, I suddenly imagined myself joyfully swimming in God's mercy, a pool of healing balm just waiting to meet me in the places I was most tender. There is no need to resist the mercy that longs to heal us.

I thought of the idea of commitment again during our Adult Faith Forum on Wednesday night. We talked about the chapter *Jesus Understands Feelings of Abandonment* in James Martin's book <u>Seven Last Words: An Invitation to a Deeper Friendship with Jesus</u>. In the chapter, we are invited to the foot of the cross as Jesus cries out: ""Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Jesus' crucifixion is filled with heartbreaking moments, but







perhaps none so utterly gut wrenching. Jesus, the Messiah, God with Us, feels utterly deserted in that moment.

As we contemplated that cry coming forth from Jesus, we were invited to consider the difference between feeling abandoned and believing we are abandoned. We shared the realization that if Jesus cried out to God in his anguish, he was still in relationship with God. We don't cry out to someone we believe will not hear us. Even in his deepest, barely conceivable grief, Jesus cries out to God. One of the many thoughtful members of our group offered a reflection, that perhaps the infrastructure of faith and belief remains even if we don't sense God in a particular moment, even if God seems absent. As I thought about his observation, I realized that feels like commitment. That feels like covenant. That infrastructure of faith stands regardless of our experience of any particular moment because it is not about any particular moment. That faith infrastructure is our covenant, our promise, our deepest commitment to God, the God we know is in covenantal relationship with us. In his book The Art of Being Together, Frank Wade notes that commitment "...allows people to share great passion and real anger. It permits surprises as well as disappointments...It has room for confidence and confusion, fear and joy...It always has the capacity for forgiveness, recovery...renewal." Forgiveness, recovery, renewal- these are some of the building blocks of our faith.

During Lent, we are invited to think about forgiveness, recovery, and renewal with special intention. There are many ways to do this within our faith community. Our Book of Common Prayer offers the rite of The Reconciliation of a Penitent, a rite that can offer the chance to experience the healing balm of God's mercy. If you would like to speak more about that, I would be glad to talk with you, and I know Fr. Tim would be too. If you're curious about our Adult Faith Forum, you are welcome to join us this Wednesday, when we talk about Chapter 5 in Martin's book: Jesus Understands Physical Pain. Our God is not remote from us but completely understands our human experience. If you want to join us but need us to purchase a copy of the book for you, just let me know. I'll get it to your doorstep before next week. If you'd like to reflect on our daily scripture during this season, check out our Lenten blog.

Our covenantal relationship with God tells us that God is near to us, pursuing us, longing for us to turn our hearts over to the abundant love and mercy that is core to who God is. We grow in that covenantal relationship when we encourage each other along the way. Let us

grow together.

Fully Vaccinated? Here Are Your Rules

The CDC has unveiled guidelines for those who have been vaccinated, starting with, what qualifies for "fully vaccinated"?

According to the CDC, people are considered fully vaccinated:

- 2 weeks after their second dose in a 2-dose series, like the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, or
- 2 weeks after a single-dose vaccine, like Johnson & Johnson's Janssen vaccine

If it has been less than 2 weeks since your shot, or if you still need to get your second dose, you are NOT fully protected. Keep taking all prevention steps until you are fully vaccinated....
