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Stay Connected

Greetings!

One of the gifts of our soft reopening is that confirmation classes have begun. We are able to meet largely in-person, with a virtual option available, and it has been a joy to spend time with some of the teenagers in our church. The auditorium is set up with chairs spread out in a large circle, and the windows are open, so it is always a little chilly. We're all wearing our masks, which means I've had to meet everyone multiple times before I could be sure who they were, but they've humored me as I've learned. Our curriculum is called Confirm, not Conform, and our first classes have been centered around thinking through what we believe, not as a church, but as individuals. Most of us know that this is a lifelong process- as we grow and gain life experiences, our beliefs sometimes change.

In one of my systematics classes in seminary, where we think through theology and philosophy, my professor showed us a diagram he'd drawn of his beliefs ten years ago, and then a diagram he'd drawn of his beliefs that year. His core commitments remained the same, but many of the beliefs around those core commitments had changed. He explained that one of the marks of a thoughtful, engaged life is that we adjust our beliefs as we learn and grow. It was quite a relief, to be honest. We don't have to have everything figured out, and it is okay if we change our minds as we encounter compelling arguments we hadn't considered before.

In our most recent confirmation class at St. Luke's, we talked about heresy, those beliefs that are strongly at odds with established customs or points of view. We talked about heresies that have turned out to be the truth, like the Earth revolving around the sun and not vice versa, and we talked about heresies that have been utterly rejected by the Church, like saying that Christ was only human or only divine and not both. Our conversation moved to how Jesus was considered heretical by some in his own time, befriending sinners and outcasts, healing on the sabbath, teaching with



authority. As we reflected together during our class, I was reminded of the debt that I owe the women who came before me who, though called heretics by some, insisted that their call to ordained ministry was real. Because of their persistence, I am able to live into my vocation today.

In my earlier faith life, when I asked questions I was often shut down by people who would tell me, in one form or another, that my question was heretical. It was a way to bring the conversation to an end, like a door slamming shut. For them, there was one right way of believing, and it was important to firmly close any doors that veered from that one right way. In the Episcopal Church, we have core commitments, and then we have a lot of variation in belief around those core commitments. Rather than emphasizing one right way, we emphasize the importance of praying and worshiping together. As we pray and worship together, so we are the body of Christ in the world together. Questions are okay, and we are invited to journey together as we grow in faith and love.

As we have walked through Holy Week, I have reflected a lot on the idea of heresy, on how Jesus lived in a way that was often utterly at odds with the system of belief for his time, of how the King of Creation took the form of a slave, the lowest of all stations in the Roman empire. In one of our Passion narratives, he is found dining at the house of Simon the leper, an act that would have been considered horrific to some. And then the most horrifying act of all, the crucifixion of Jesus Christ, Emmanuel, God with us. In Jesus' time, it was unimaginable that the Son of God would be someone who could die, and even more unimaginable that he could die in such a brutal way. The idea that the messiah could die strongly went against established beliefs, perhaps it was such a heresy that few could believe it to be true.

On this Good Friday, I invite you to sit with me in the discomfort of knowing that our Messiah utterly upended the order of his time, radically loving, forgiving, and healing those he encountered, and ultimately died for those acts. There is a King who could have saved himself but chose instead to submit to God the Father, loving us to the end, knowing that the truth would set us free.
