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Greetings!

Many of you know that we have just moved into the house we bought in West Warwick. I feel like we've become our own mini-economic stimulus package between trips to the Home Depot, Lowe's, Ikea, and Starbucks, (because honestly, this work is much easier to take on while properly caffeinated). My husband has diligently removed bolts from the walls and patched the holes they've left behind. I've arranged and rearranged our furniture, trying to figure out where things work best in the space. We've been reminded that we're really different people- I bring enthusiasm, Tim brings discipline.

The best part of our house is the big backyard, which has brought us a lot of joy as we watch our little dog blissfully run around it. The previous owners fenced in a terrific garden; but when we moved in, it was basically a display space for weeds. And there was so much straw. Tim was pretty exhausted by all the work required inside our home; he was not inspired to take on the garden area. But I was super excited. Some of you know that by the time I was 18 years old I'd moved 18 times. Moving that much does not allow for the cultivation of a garden - it's hard to commit to any home when every home is temporary - but here was a space that was meant for planting things and watching them grow! I cleared out three garbage bags full of weeds and straw...and after all that work it looked like I had barely touched the space. So I spent some time intentionally clearing out one small corner, and I planted one little strawberry plant, imagining that at least something good would happen in our garden this year.

Seeing my enthusiasm, Tim bought bags meant for yard waste, found attachments to his weeder to allow for tilling, and he went to work. Tim was raised in Idaho, and he takes proper tilling and creating rows very seriously. At first I was annoyed - his methodical process interrupted my play and I was very protective of the tiniest of strawberry plants in the far corner of the garden. But Tim persisted, clearing out weeds and rocks, filling three more enormous bags with yard waste. As he continued to work, I went around the edges and planted marigolds, which made me happy and hopeful. He amended the soil. I thought we were ready to plant. Then he smoothed out the soil. I thought finally we could plant. Then he made his rows. I was frustrated - why couldn't I plant yet? He finished and...the rows were perfect. It was so easy to plant my vegetable seeds, and it made me happy knowing that they were going into fertile soil and that they would not be competing with rocks and weeds as they spread their roots. And he had lovingly protected my tiny strawberry plant. Tim was so delighted to prepare the space for me; he saw that I loved it, and my loving it inspired him to care for it. Without his work, my enthusiasm would have yielded next to nothing; but without my enthusiasm, he wouldn't have taken on the work.

I thought of that while spending time in the dining room at St. Luke's Tuesday amidst the hustle and bustle of people getting ready for the yard sale on Saturday. So many people had gathered together, helping unload items as they arrived, sorting and pricing. The energy in the room was good and happy, with people really enjoying each other's company as they worked. The room is absolutely full of things for sale; it would be overwhelming for one or two people to try to manage. While a few people have anchored the effort, (thank you Deborah, Laura, Bill, Jon, and Pam!), they have not had to do it alone. Many people have brought their enthusiasm, their discipline, their desire to help in whatever way they can. Some people are donating items, some are lifting heavy things, some people are separating out boutique items, some people are sorting and pricing. Not everyone can do everything, but when we each do what we can, the work gets done.

I'm reminded of Paul's letter to the Corinthians: "Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone...For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ." I'm so grateful for the saints of St. Luke's, where when we each of us faithfully offers the gifts we're given, the needs of the church are abundantly met and good things find the room to grow.


