The Episcopal Church

Over the last few weeks, I've run into people who, in the course of our conversations have said something to the effect of: "Everything happens for a reason" or "I guess it's just part of God's plan." I always cringe when I hear that. It's not that I'm unsympathetic to where that comes from- we long to trust God, and when things happen that baffle us or people are hurt and we can't imagine why, we hope that there's a greater reason, a greater purpose for it. If God loves us, why else would God allow suffering to exist?

I've heard something like that my whole life. My baby brother (who honestly hasn't been a baby for decades), was born with severe club feet. He was in casts and braces almost the entire time we were growing up. He also had ear infections that were so severe he couldn't hear properly and had to have several sets of tubes. Because of the ear infections, he was speech delayed. Many of my earliest memories are of being in the hospital with my mom and brother as he got his casts changed, new braces fit, or was examined by another specialist. My dad was early in his career as a Marine Corps officer, and so Mom was often on her own with two small kids. I remember when it occurred to me that she had managed all of that beginning in her early 20's, and I could not believe how easy she had made it all look. My brother and I always knew we were loved and special to her; she just took care of things and made things happen as though it was normal.

Because we were in the hospital so much, I saw many kids who were dealing with serious health issues. Some were recovering from severe burns, some did not have fully developed limbs, some had a myriad of health issues that clustered together in impossible knots. Here is one of my firm convictions: God did not need any of that to happen. God did not need those children to suffer. God did not need those families to suffer. Our God, who is Love Incarnate, did not need any of that to happen for a greater plan.

Here is another of my firm convictions: God makes all things new. God brings light from places of darkness, God brings hope from places of hopelessness, God brings new life from death. Think of all of the decisions we make every day and the decisions those around us make. Our common life depends on one another. When we make choices, they don't just impact us but they impact those around us. Some of those choices bring pain, but some bring life. My brother had access to world class care at the Shriner's Hospital because there was a network of people who sought out kids like him and then made sure that their needs were met. Those kids became family to one another. Their families supported one another. We learned compassion and care and resilience and even joy that persists despite our circumstances. We learned that healing sometimes looks like someone's illness resolving and healing sometimes looks like learning to live fully with our wounds still present.

My baby brother is now a grown man, smart and kind, funny and loyal, a ridiculously hard worker, and just an all-around good person. He has not had an easy life; but if he meets you, he won't tell you about that. He'll want to hear your story; he'll want to know how you're doing. He's got a deeply empathetic heart that is a gift to those who get to call him friend. My brother has known light in times of darkness, and now he is a light to others.

This is our call too. We are people who believe that darkness does not own us because we are children of the light. We are people of resurrection. We are people who profess that new life comes from the most unexpected places. Our call is to name those places of hurt and grief, and then to faithfully, patiently, and expectantly be present so that when new life is revealed to us we are ready to proclaim it. That faithful living, that being present with one another in good times and bad, that attentiveness to joy and hope, that expectation of resurrection and new life, that is God's plan for us. So let us go forth into the world, rejoicing in the power of the Spirit.

4. If you have not liked our page, you may have to scroll down the page to find the livestream while it is happening due to the way Facebook works. Once the livestream concludes, the video of the service will be available at the top of our page, (so you will not have to scroll to find it).



If you would like your child to participate, (entirely up to parents' discretion), these are the guidelines we've received from the director of the movie: Young choir members or participants who are not vaccinated will need to take a rapid Covid test not more than 48 hours in advance and provide proof they are negative for Covid.

For the youth, they will need to be at St. Luke's from 3:00-5:00PM. They will need a waiver signed by parent or guardian, per SAG requirements. I will pass that waiver on to any interested parties.

For the wedding guests, they will need to be present from 3:00-6:00, dressed in your most glorious wedding attire (glamourous dresses and fancy hats appreciated for the women; suits, ties, for the men-- no tuxes though).

The more the merrier for the adults. He is hoping for 10 or more for the youth choir. I told him I thought we could accommodate.
