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Last year, we were renting a house in Newport that was furnished with someone else's stuff. It was nice stuff, but that it was nice just made me hyper-aware of not damaging anything. We lavish our dog with misplaced parental affection, but in that house we were extremely aware of not letting her up on places she might damage. The pretty patterns on the furniture were concealed with multiple blankets meant to minimize any risk of wear and tear. When Christmas came around, we realized our Christmas things were in the very back of our storage unit. Being a two-clergy household, there was no time to take a day and pull everything out to get our Christmas stuff and put everything else back in the unit. The storage unit was stacked together like a game of Tetris, and neither my husband nor I had the energy to play that game again.

When I was growing up, we were pretty broke, and I had lived the wisdom that Christmas is not about the stuff. But when Christmas came around last year and the house was not decorated- not a single thing of our own or any of the trinkets we had collected over the years- I fell into a serious slump. I missed our stuff. The house felt sterile and cold. My husband mentioned this in conversation with his senior warden, and she materialized with boxes of things for us to use- boxes of her stuff that she wanted to share with us. My favorite thing was a wreath she and her son handmade for us- a blue ribbon wrapped wreath hot glued with pretty sparkly little balls and silvery reindeer coming from either side. It finally felt like the holidays when we hung that wreath.

This year, we are in our own home. We had looked at artificial trees but didn't like anything we saw. As the season sped up, we resigned ourselves to not having a tree again this year. But I did pull out our decorations- gifts from my mother-in-law, some hand-knitted things my friend in Arizona made us, some trinkets from my trip to the Holy Land. As I pulled out those decorations, I saw our ornaments, and it made me sad that we weren't going to have a tree.

Monday, as I was driving home from a funeral at Veterans Memorial Cemetery, I passed a small shop with potted trees and greenery out front. I was in our Honda sedan, but the trees looked small enough to fit in the car. Though I had driven right past the shop I turned the car around, found a tree out front that I liked, and went in to purchase it – still wearing my cassock. There was one guy in the shop, and he seemed amused to see me, but he sold me the tree and helped me stuff it into the back of the car. (My sense of size and space was off by just enough that the Honda will never be the same.) I arrived home feeling victorious and happy.

We have the first ornament I ever selected, purchased for me when I was in middle school by a dear family friend who has since passed. We found the nativity sets Tim was gifted when the spiritual director who had seen him through his discernment process before seminary died a few years ago.

We are now surrounded by love everywhere we look, reminded of people who have shaped our lives, reminded that Jesus is Love Incarnate, and that we have experienced God's deep, abiding love in our lives. This Christmas I hope you are reminded of the love that has seen you through to this point too. I hope that the stuff that makes up your Christmas fills your heart and brings glad tidings of great joy.

Zelle Transfer

Zelle Payment – with Zelle payment transfer, you can add St. Luke's Church by using the giving@stlukeseg.org address.

Benefits: Ease of use – if you already use Zelle, then you are familiar with making payments this way. This only makes one

payment at a time, so you have to initiate

VANCO Payment Solutions

VANCO Payments – With VANCO payments, you create your individual account on the VANCO site, set up how you want to pay, and the funds are deposited in the Church's account

Benefits: If you like points or miles, then this is your site! VANCO is the only option that accepts credit cards. Like Online Banking, you can set up recurring payments or make single payments

Transaction Fees for the Church

Direct Payment From IRA

Direct Transfer – If you are 70 ½ or older, you can instruct your IRA provider to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution directly from your IRA.

Benefits: Any funds paid this way are not reported as taxable income to you. You can make your entire yearly pledge with one payment, help satisfy your required distribution, and incur no tax on the income.

No cost to you or the Church

If you have requested pledge envelopes, they are located in the atrium.

Advent and Godly Play

Advent, (from Latin adventus, "coming"), in the Christian church calendar, the period of preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ at Christmas.

No doubt your children are in fact already 'preparing' for Christmas in their own sweet way.

'Christmas' is usually their answer to the question, "What is your favorite holiday?" While it is often difficult to keep in mind during holiday celebrations, lights, shopping; the season of Advent is a very holy time.

The next few weeks in Godly Play we will be focusing on Advent. The children will each receive a very special package that was handmade especially for them. It is their first Christmas gift this year. Ask them about it..invite them to teach you about Advent. We really look forward to seeing you children each Sunday, these next Sundays will be especially meaningful. we hope to see them!

Fun Facts...

The Advent wreath first appeared in Germany in 1839. A <u>Lutheran</u> minister working at a mission for children created a wreath out of the wheel of a cart. He placed twenty small red candles and four large white candles inside the ring. The red candles were lit on weekdays and the four white candles were lit on Sundays.

Eventually, the Advent wreath was created out of evergreens, symbolizing everlasting life in the midst of winter and death. The circle reminds us of God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible. Advent candles are often nestled in the evergreen wreath.

The four weeks Advent is broken down into four themes. These themes are represented by the four candles on the Advent wreath.

- 1. Hope or promise
- 2. Preparation or faith
- 3. Joy
- 4. Love or adoration

An Advent Prayer

Prayer is a wonderful way to help cut away from distractions of the season and open your heart to prepare for the joy and hope of Christ's birth. Here is a sample prayer to use during the season to focus your heart and mind for the birth of Jesus Christ.

This Advent, Lord, come to the manger of my heart.

Fill me with Your presence from the very start.

As I prepare for the holidays and gifts to be given,

Remind me of the gift You gave when You sent Your Son from Heaven.

The first Christmas gift, it was the greatest gift ever.

You came as a baby born in a manger.

Wrapped like the gifts I find under my tree,

Waiting to be opened, to reveal Your love to me.

Restore to me the wonder that came with Jesus' birth,

When He left the riches of Heaven and wrapped Himself in rags of earth.

Immanuel, God with us, Your presence came that night.

And angels announced, "Into your darkness, God brings His Light."

"Do not be afraid," they said, to shepherds in the field.

Speak to my heart today, Lord, and help me to yield.

Make me like those shepherd boys, obedient to Your call.
