Greetings!

A few years ago, a classmate and I launched a summer chapel on Hatteras Island in the Outer Banks of North Carolina. We were kind of pioneers out there, on the last island connected to other islands by bridge, about an hour away from the closest Episcopal church. It was a remarkable experience. At first, we had imagined a sort of vacation chapel; but as we got to know people, we realized dozens of Episcopalians lived there year-around. We offered Morning Prayer on the beach by a lifeguard stand and Evening Prayer once a week at the Catholic Church where a cool old priest who had been a missioner in South America was happy to let us set up. My classmate collaborated with the Methodist minister in youth group activities, and I found myself at the farmers market introducing our ministry and setting up lady's luncheons to connect some amazing women I had met. The work had begun slowly, with one family regularly coming for Morning Prayer, but by the middle of July we had gained some traction, built some solid relationships, and gotten the word out about our work. It was so exciting- things were happening! And then the flood came.

Every time it rained on the island, we became aware of how it was really a glorified sand bar. The island is very narrow- maybe a mile across, and the water table was already so high that it flooded every time it rained. The extra water had nowhere to go, nowhere to drain away, and so it just became deeper. A couple of times it had rained so much that we couldn't go anywhere for a few days because the roads had literally been washed away by the water and sand. But then it flooded. It rained hard and long and the puddles became ponds. There were fish swimming in the water that flooded the sidewalk outside our house. We were less than a half mile away from the grocery store, but there was absolutely no way to get there. It took almost two weeks for those waters to subside, and by that time we were about two weeks away from heading back to seminary.

The bishop in the Diocese of East Carolina, where our chapel had been dreamed up, came to meet with us and hear about our experiences. He took us out to lunch and asked how things were going. I told him about how excited we had been, how we had just gotten the wheels under our ministry, and how many people we had met who were glad that we were there. And I told him how the flood seemed to wipe that all away.

Bishop Skirving has a gentle joy about him. He smiled as I spoke, and when I was through, he told me that he had grown up around farmland. As a child, he had learned that the rhythm of nature is often out of our control. We are responsible for doing our work the

best we can, for planting and sowing in their seasons, but so much of life is beyond our control. We do our work trusting that God is already present and that the Holy Spirit will move in ways we cannot imagine. A flood may halt our work, but a flood does not halt the work of God.

I've been thinking about that a lot the last several weeks, as Omicron has ripped its way through our state. So much of life has felt outside of our control. We have started and stopped, pivoted and regrouped, popped up and then hunkered back down. We have learned and adjusted, been flexible and creative. We have experienced things that are out of our control. We have experienced that control is an illusion. We have experienced the presence of God in our lives. We have shared community with one another. We have supported one another and our neighbors. Whatever is happening around us, God continues to love us. The Holy Spirit continues to speak and move and call to us.

The seasons may change. The floods may come. The work of God continues.

Overall, the year was financially positive. And here comes the but:

- ·When you combine last year's loss and this year's profit, we net +\$12,820
- ·We were able to do this mainly because of \$120,000 in PPP money. Take away that, and the Church would have been a combined \$107,180 in the red. That's how the pandemic hit our bottom line.
- ·We have also been conservative in our spending we should take a moment and acknowledge the staff and leaders that worked within their budgets, controlling expenses whenever possible.
- ·Rental income is still experiencing a slump due to Covid while some groups can work with our layouts and provide proper spacing, groups like the music school really can't do much in a small classroom while being in closer confines with students.
- ·We also used ALL the income from the invested funds some \$43,000 more than usual for the two years.
- · In short, we're not quite where we need to be.

Online Banking

Bill Pay — with online bill pay, you add St. Luke's Church as a payee, enter our address of 99 Peirce St. East Greenwich, RI 02818 and schedule your payment.

Benefits: Ease of use – if you already use online bill pay, then you are familiar with making payments this way. You can schedule single payments, or set up regular payments in advance.

No cost to you or the Church.

Zelle Transfer

Zelle Payment – with Zelle payment transfer, you can add St. Luke's Church by using the giving@stlukeseg.org address.

Benefits: Ease of use – if you already use Zelle, then you are familiar with making

Zelle, then you are familiar with making payments this way. This only makes one payment at a time, so you have to initiate each payment.

No cost to you or the Church

VANCO Payment Solutions

VANCO Payments – With VANCO payments, you create your individual account on the VANCO site, set up how you want to pay, and the funds are deposited in the Church's account

Benefits: If you like points or miles, then this is your site! VANCO is the only option that accepts credit cards. Like Online Banking, you can set up recurring payments or make single payments

Transaction Fees for the Church

Direct Payment From IRA

Direct Transfer – If you are 70 ½ or older, you can instruct your IRA provider to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution directly from your IRA. Benefits: Any funds paid this way are not reported as taxable income to you. You can make your entire yearly pledge with one payment, help satisfy your required distribution, and incur no tax on the income.
