Greetings!

Knost

I write this note on the Feast Day of the Epiphany.

While many in our culture today consider Epiphany as the sign that it's time to take down a wilting Christmas tree, for the ancient church, Epiphany meant so much more. The Feast of the Epiphany reminded all Christians to consider the many signs that God had been born into our world.

Of course, the greatest of these signs was the baby, Jesus, lying in a manger, discovered first by the shepherds and then by the Magi. (We heard the story of the Magi just last Sunday.)

You know, in the same way that it is important we understand the shock of lowly shepherds being the first to hear of Jesus' birth, it's important for us to appreciate the scandal that magi feature so prominently in the revelation of this good news.

Like in the case of the shepherds, over time the Magi have had their identities rewritten and glorified—including the notion that they were actually kings (They were not!). In reality, the magi of Jesus' time were considered sinners, pagan astrologers with crazy beliefs. Rather than reading the Torah they read tea leaves; rather than following the commandments they followed stars.

But in the case of Matthew's story, how fortunate, how blessed were they to have a bright light they might follow! It was this light that guided their long and improbable journey. It was this light that led them to Jesus. And it was this light that helped them to discover the new and unimaginable thing that God was doing.

For the Magi, the epiphany in Jesus was a revelation of the depth and breadth of God's love for all of humanity. In their visit with Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, they discovered that God's love for creation was so deep that God was willing to walk among us, struggle among us, suffer among us. In being invited to make that visit, they learned that God's love for humanity was so wide as to include the religious and skeptics, the rich and poor, the magisterial and the magi.

All of this promise and hope revealed in the birth of a baby. All of

this promise and hope discovered because the Magi followed the light of a guiding star.

I also write this note on January 6, the one-year anniversary of an attack on our Capitol.

Many in this country still feel as if we are walking in the shroud of darkness that produced such an unimaginable event. Some are searching desperately for signs of love, kindness, civility and hope to be born anew. And I imagine at least a few of us are looking up into the heavens for a star or light that might provide us such a sign. All of this is understandable, especially given the trauma and trials we have endured these past twenty four months.

But let me suggest, the heavens might not be the place for us to begin our search.

In reading author Louise Penny's recent newsletter I came across these words from L.R. Knost: *"Do not be dismayed by the brokenness of the world. All things break, and all things can be mended. Not with time, as they say, but with intention. So go. Love intentionally, extravagantly, unconditionally. The broken world waits in darkness for the light that is you."*

How apt her words for a time when much in the world seems broken and when much of our days seem dark. But more than that, how fitting her words as we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany.

The Jesus story promises that God loves "intentionally, extravagantly, unconditionally." The Feast of the Epiphany reminds us that God will provide us signs which reveal this promise. If we are to find a light to give us direction and hope, then maybe we should not look up. Maybe we should not look even to others. Maybe we should begin our search by looking in the mirror!

After all, each of us is created in God's image. Each of us carries a spark of the holy. Each of us is filled with the Holy Spirit.

And just one more thing. If the face you see looking back at you seems like an unlikely or inadequate source of light, remember, the shepherds and magi were hardly believed to be the likeliest persons to bear the good news of Jesus into a time filled with great darkness.

In this book Taylor writes, "Darkness is shorthand for anything that scares me-- either because I am sure that I do not have the resources to survive it or because I do not want to find out. (But) I have learned things in the dark that I could never have learned in the light, things that have saved my life over and over again, so that there is really only one conclusion. I need the darkness as much as I need light."

About the author, Time magazine writes, "Few souls are as synched to the world's mysteries as Barbara Brown Taylor's... Taylor writes spiritual nonfiction that rivals the poetic power of C.S. Lewis and Frederick Buechner."
