Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I was listening to a conversation on NPR earlier this week where the question was, "Are we as kind as we think we are?" I can understand the timing, given the current, polarization, acrimony, and disrespect which seems to run rampant in so much of our national life and around the globe.

One of the guests on the show, a gentleman from Andover, MA., spoke of founding something he called "The Kindness Collaborative," this in response to the struggles and isolation so many have experienced over the past two years. Within months, he reported, over seven thousand individuals had signed on to "collaborate." Wow!!

Hearing the discussion tuned my ears and focused my eyes to note the many examples of kindness that seem to pop up almost daily at St. Luke's. I recalled the kindness in Corie Jacaruso's voice as she welcomed a new child into the Godly Play room last Sunday. (By the way, we had 12 children come for Godly Play that day!!)

I recalled the kindness of two different households, members of St. Luke's, who offered last week to be major sponsors of our golf tournament—both not only to honor a beloved family member but also in appreciation for all that St. Luke's has meant to their families. (Stay tuned for more information on that front!)

I recalled the kindness of another household which has offered to donate the monies necessary to improve our parking lot lighting. "We have been so wonderfully welcomed here," came the explanation, "and we want those who come for evening programs to feel safe and welcomed as well."

I recalled the kindness of our pastoral care committee who met this week, prayed for all those on our prayer list, and discussed how they might provide more care for persons in need.

And I recalled the kindness (and patience!) of Gary Schweizer and the entire kitchen renovation team as I learned that our dining room had passed inspection and we now possessed the long-awaited-for certificate of occupancy. All that remains is for the health inspector to give his seal of approval to our kitchen and we will be open for business! (Take a moment to go down there again and check out the new matching refrigerators, a credit to the kindness and perseverance of Steve and Lois McLoughlin.)

And all this kindness was just in the past week!

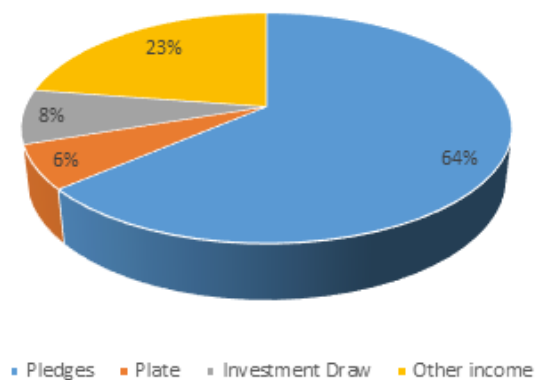

The sewer lining repair has been completed and paid for.

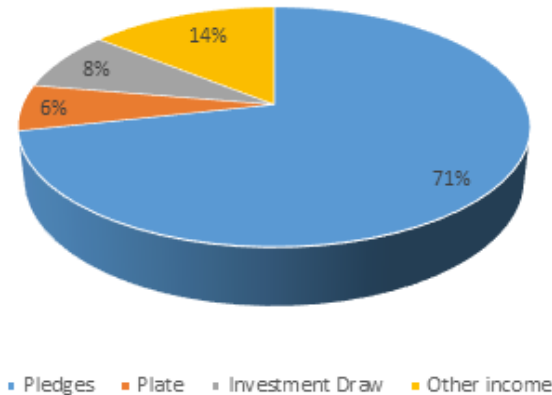

#### Online Banking

**Bill Pay** – with online bill pay, you add St. Luke's Church as a payee, enter our address of 99 Peirce St. East Greenwich, RI 02818 and schedule your payment.

**Benefits:** Ease of use – if you already use online bill pay, then you are familiar with making payments this way. You can schedule single payments, or set up regular payments in advance.

No cost to you or the Church.

#### Zelle Transfer

**Zelle Payment** – with Zelle payment transfer, you can add St. Luke's Church by using the [giving@stlukeseg.org](mailto:giving@stlukeseg.org) address.

**Benefits:** Ease of use – if you already use Zelle, then you are familiar with making payments this way. This only makes one payment at a time, so you have to initiate each payment.

No cost to you or the Church

#### VANCO Payment Solutions

**VANCO Payments** – With VANCO payments, you create your individual account on the VANCO site, set up how you want to pay, and the funds are deposited in the Church's account

**Benefits:** If you like points or miles, then this is your site! VANCO is the only option that accepts credit cards. Like Online Banking, you can set up recurring payments or make single payments

Transaction Fees for the Church

#### Direct Payment From IRA

**Direct Transfer** – If you are 70 ½ or older, you can instruct your IRA provider to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution directly from your IRA.

**Benefits:** Any funds paid this way are not reported as taxable income to you. You can make your entire yearly pledge with one payment, help satisfy your required distribution, and incur no tax on the income.

### Adult Faith Formation Lenten Book Study

"Jesus came preaching, but the church wound up preaching Jesus. Why does the church insist on making Jesus the *object* of its attention rather than heeding his *message*? (The late) Harvard minister, Peter J. Gomes, believes that excessive focus on the Bible and doctrines about Jesus have led the Christian church astray. To recover the transformative power of the gospel Gomes says we must go beyond the Bible and rediscover how to live out Jesus' original revolutionary message of hope. "

(Gomes writes,) "... *Hope is not merely the optimistic view that somehow everything will turn out all right in the end if everyone just does as we do. Hope is the more rugged, the more muscular view that even if things don't turn out all right and aren't all right, we endure through and beyond the times that disappoint or threaten to destroy us.*"

**This Lent, I hope you'll join me and others in reading Peter Gomes' *The Scandalous Gospel*. Please read Chapter 2 in preparation for our second class.**

## Corporate Communion

### Corporate Communion

Dear Parents,

The Corporate Communion program at St. Luke's is about to begin! It is open to all children in the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grades.

Children understand the symbolism and significance of the Eucharist in ways that are often surprising and delightful. It is no wonder that Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me!"

Since the 1991 *Prayerbook*, our church has lived into the theology that Baptism is full initiation into the Body of Christ, moving away from the idea that Confirmation and "understanding" are the bench marks for participation in the Eucharist.

Corporate Communion is a remarkable communion instruction, *not preparation class*. It is designed to offer age-appropriate theology, liturgy and tradition to children. **Children are not the future of the church, they are the church today.** This class honors their full membership in the Body of Christ, and equips us grownups for the vows we made at their Baptism that we would support them in their life in Christ.

## INTERNET SAFETY

# Tips for staying safe & secure online

### USE STRONG PASSWORDS

- Use a unique password for each of your most sensitive accounts (think email or banking)
- Use a long passphrase such as the title of the last book you read; add in punctuation for extra security. For example: *ILoveGoingtoStLukes143!*
- Don't include personal information in your password



### DON'T TAKE THE BAIT

- Be cautious of any email or text that:
- Tries to create a sense of urgency or instill fear
  - Uses a generic greeting or closure
  - Contains an unexpected link or attachment
  - Includes a request for private or sensitive information



### SHARING ON SOCIAL

- Never share sensitive information on social media - it's not just your friends out there!
- Don't add people to your network if you don't know them in real life
- Avoid questionnaires, "free giveaways", and contests - these are typically designed to elicit sensitive information



### KEEP YOUR PERSONAL INFO PRIVATE

- Never enter financial information on an insecure website (look for the padlock or "https://")
- When signing up for something online, read the terms & conditions. If it's free, your data is usually the cost!



### TRUST BUT VERIFY

- Always trust your gut!
- Never be afraid to independently verify a request; especially when it's financial.....call the sender directly using a number that you have or that you look up online



### COMMON CYBER SCHEMES

- The following themes are commonly used by attackers:
- Romance scams
  - Tech support
  - Grandparent scam (posing as a relative looking for financial assistance)
  - Government impersonation
  - Sweepstakes/charity/lottery
