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Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Talk about a tale of two cities.

Last Sunday, Tom Sprague, Tanya and I gathered with sixteen teenagers to complete their two-year confirmation course. Each one shared with the group a Biblical verse she or he had selected and memorized, and told us why it was meaningful to them. Then, as we sat outside, basking in the glorious East Greenwich day, enjoying pizza and birthday cake in honor of Lily Messier, the teens, one by one, met with us to discuss whether or not they desired to be confirmed. In advance I had told them I would support either choice; all I asked was that, regardless of their decision, they be able to explain why.

I could not have been more moved and proud of each and every students' response. They were thoughtful, articulate, and respectful—a clear indicator of how far they had journeyed over these past two years. As I drove home that afternoon, I thought to myself, how blessed I am to share church and life with these teenagers.

Also as I drove home, I listened to reports coming from another city, Buffalo, about the efforts of another teenager, who here shall remain nameless. As you all know by now, on Saturday, May 14, an eighteen-year-old White male drove two hundred miles to a carefully selected, predominantly African-American neighborhood, entered a grocery store, killing ten, injuring three others, and leaving an entire community grief-stricken.

Talk about a tale of two cities.

By Monday, authorities had discovered the teen's numerous social media posts detailing his carefully researched plans, including the decision to target a grocery store rather than a church or elementary school—this because of the larger numbers expected to be present at the market. The story chilled my blood.

But then, what made my blood boil was the report regarding the shooter's motivations. In a manifesto obtained by authorities and apparently written by the teenager, he discussed his concerns about the dwindling White population in this country and articulated the conspiracy claims that White elitists are engaging in cultural replacement for political benefits—a theory otherwise known "Replacement Theory."

Lest you think this theory, or some variation of it, is the thinking of the mentally troubled alone, a May 2022 poll by the A.P. found that one third of American adults believed "that an effort was underway

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to replace native born Americans with immigrants for electoral gains." And none of us should be all that surprised by this finding, given that in recent years US senators and television commentators alike are espousing similar beliefs.

Whether all of this rhetoric and violence is a matter of extremism, mental instability, or evil is a conversation for another place. What I know is that this thinking and the violence that extends from it are antithetical to the Kingdom of God.

Words and ideology shape our communal experience. They can be used to promote compassion, peace, understanding, and life. Or they can be used to promote fear, hate, violence, and death. All of which makes the conversations and considerations of our sixteen confirmation students so crucial.

Over the span of two years, we have talked about a God of love, about a Jesus of compassion, and about a gospel of inclusion. And although moving forward their beliefs about Christianity might vary, I do believe that each of them will be entering adulthood with a shared appreciation for common decency and mutual respect. The language of our faith speaks to this; the ideas of our church promote this.

Last weekend was a tale of two cities. Truth be told, this weekend will be much the same tale. In East Greenwich we will celebrate the efforts and thinking of several teenagers. Whereas in Buffalo, they will grieve the acts and thoughts of one teenager.

But this tale is not done being written. Each of us, you and I, have agency as co-authors with God. In the relationships we share and the language we speak, we add pages to the tale.

This Sunday, I invite you to join me in celebrating our confirmands. I invite you to confirm along with them that "...you will strive for justice and peace and respect the dignity of every human being" (BCP p.417). And I invite you to pray for our brothers and sisters in Buffalo (please see the prayer below).

May God forgive us and guide us until the day that our two cities resemble the one Holy City for which Jesus gave his life so many years ago.


- o Utilities up \$3,756
- o Property new repairs for heating in auditorium of \$3,600 uncovered more work of almost \$10,000 that will be needed
- o Fire panel replacement will be \$2,200
- o Parking lot sealing/striping has been put on hold
- o At this point the expected property cost will be around \$3,800 over budget for the year, along with utility overages

Overall, we're still ahead of the budget bottom line by \$15,052. Hard to say if the economy is affecting our income – we are definitely seeing it hit our expenses, though.


If you take off the \$65,000 in PPP money from last year's income, we would be roughly \$10,000 ahead of last year. But we were also closed last year until mid-March, and operated at a somewhat reduced capacity after that. So all that means is the pandemic is making any meaningful analysis somewhat difficult.

The host provides juice, creamer for the coffee (although powdered coffee creamer is available in a pinch), and some baked goods of some sort. All supplies like cups, napkins, sugar, utensils are all located in the cupboard in the Blackburn Room. There are a few platters you can use to put goodies on. A table is set up in the atrium with a tablecloth on it. Afterwards, we ask that the coffee urn be washed out and set out to dry in the sink area of the Blackburn Room.

You can host with a friend, you can host with your kids, you can host solo - it's a wonderful way to be part of our St. Luke's hospitality – welcoming new faces and encouraging us all to reconnect in person after so many months of being apart.
