# January 15, 2023

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This past Sunday I was introduced to the idea of "chalking" the door as a part of Epiphany. In case you missed it, the idea is that you take some chalk and write 20+C+M+B+23 on your door. The marking speaks to the year and references both three magi who have been named by tradition (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar) as well as the Latin phrase *Christus Mansionem Benedictat* (may Christ bless this house). During the service Father Tim reminded us that the practice of marking your door traces back to our Jewish ancestors who would mark their doors for Passover.

I was thrilled to learn a new tradition, especially one connected to a centuries old practice that calls us to remember the importance of hospitality as well as the importance of looking to Christ for blessing. I was also thrilled because I now had permission to write and mark up my door with chalk. This was graffiti that was sanctioned by my faith!

Beyond just marking my door, I see the "chalking" as a sign and statement about those of us who dwell in the home. It is supposed to be a sign of welcome for the Magi who might be making their way either to Bethlehem or back home. It is a way of saying to the traveler that this home is a place where they could find rest and comfort.

This practice of chalking an entry goes beyond the religious realms. It has long been a tradition in the Hobo community in the early 1900s to mark a place so others may know what to expect (and very likely continues to be a tradition for those who continue to be urban nomads). If you went to a home and found a rough, simplistic drawing of a cat on the fence or next to the door you knew that a kind lady lived there. If you saw a drawing of a circle with an X in it you knew that this was a safe and good place to hang out. A picture of a bird would indicate a free use of the phone, and a cross would suggest that one could get a free meal if they were willing to sit through a sermon. These are just some of the many chalk symbols that hobos and other nomads would leave on homes or benches or streets to let others know what they might expect. They were signs of encouragement as well as signs of warning; if law enforcement, a judge, or someone who did not take kindly to hobos was at that home. It is a chalking, but instead of being marked by the people who live there they are marked by the recipients of the hospitality (or the lack of hospitality).

Thinking of nomads and hospitality, I am drawn to the hiking community and other types of hospitality. On the longer trails (the Appalachian Trail or the Pacific Crest Trail for example), there are people who are known as "trail angels." These are individuals who will leave gifts of water, food, and other refreshments on the trail for thru-hikers. They will also take hikers places to resupply and sometimes offer a safe place to stay. There is not usually any chalking to let someone know if you are near or around a trail angel. These are individuals who will typically engage the hiking community actively, not waiting for someone to knock on their door **Sisters**

but instead will drive to trail-heads, leave gifts, and ask hikers if they need anything. When hiking in Arizona I found a cache of water left by a trail angel and marked for hiker use; I will always be grateful for that trail angel and the cool, clean drink of water!

Robert Louis Stevenson once wrote, "We are all travelers... in the wilderness of this world,... and the best we can find in our travels is an honest friend" (from "Travels with a Donkey in the Cévennes"). There are times when we may feel more settled and other times when we may feel more uprooted and in the depth of the journey. Perhaps the honest friend is the one who is ready to help, assist, guide, and offer a place to rest. In our journeys of life, we find hospitality. In essence, that is one thing that connects all three engagements with the nomadic lifestyle. The first engagement, the chalking, is a way of telling the Magi that they are welcome as well as a way of reminding us of our faith, and reminding us how important it is to ask God into our homes. For some, the century old practice can be seen as a way of reminding us who we are and sharing this with others who are "in the know." The second chalking is a way for others to say who you are according to them. It is their way of expressing their experience of you and letting others know who you are. This is the shared story, the shared experience inviting or warning the nomad who has yet to come across your door. The third level of engagement is a way of sharing who you are with those in need without waiting for them to even find and knock on your door.

I am finding that all three are valid and appropriate. I like the idea of a reminder when entering the home. Remember who you are! I like the idea of others sharing your reputation (if it is good) and marking you for others to find and engage. I like the idea of being active, of seeking out the needs of those who are traveling and helping them where they are. Think about this with St. Luke's. We have more overt reminders of who we are with the multiple symbols and signs that are around and inside the building. We have a reputation in the community and the State and we hope it is a good one (sometimes we find that we have to battle a negative reputation because we are a Church). I would argue that people show up on Wednesdays for lunch and one Monday a month for supper says that maybe the church is marked in a good way and has a good reputation when it comes to hospitality. And finally, we go out and try to be "angels" for others with programs like Loaves and Fishes. We are travelling through life and trying to offer and be an offering of hospitality to others who we meet.

In our faith, I realize that indeed we are marked. We are marked externally with our actions and internally with the love and grace of God through Jesus Christ. As a community and as individuals we have been "chalked" by God, by others, and by ourselves. I hope and pray that the ways we have been marked remind us of the blessing of being a follower of Christ as well as shining a blessing to others.





# Job Opening - Part-time Coordinator for Youth and Family Programs

# While it is Fr. Tim's policy not to hire parishioners, if you have any friends who may be interested, please let us know.

St. Luke's Church, an inclusive, thriving, multi-generational, and joy-filled church, located in the heart of East Greenwich, is looking for a part-time program coordinator (15-18 hours per week) to expand our ministries with youth and their families.

Essential hopes and expectations include oversight of our youth faith formation offerings (curriculum selection and preparation, teacher recruitment and support), enhanced activities of a fledgling youth group, weekly communication with parents regarding how they might further their children's faith formation at home, and the development of a one-week summer Vacation Bible School.

Additional responsibilities include regular collaboration with the ministry team, the creation of seasonal offerings, assisting the rector with confirmation classes (February through May), and planning for our every-other-year mission trip to the Dominican Republic.

Appropriate candidates must have a love for youth, and a comfort and familiarity with the Christian tradition. Experience working in a youth-related setting a must; a background in education is helpful but not required.

Other important qualities and attributes include:

- · Creativity
- · Good sense of humor
- · Strong interpersonal skills
- · Flexibility
- · A demonstrated capacity to work well with others
- An energetic and energizing disposition

The weekly hours are flexible, although presence most Sunday mornings is required. With the exception of a Vacation Bible School, Faith Formation classes pause from June through August, allowing for 6 weeks of vacation time.
