Dear Brothers and Sister,

Oh my goodness—what a journey we have shared!

Too often I have found that life sweeps by at such a pace that I fail to pause, reflect, and give thanks. Given all that we have experienced since Ash Wednesday, I certainly don't want to make that error again. So let me reflect and give thanks with this note.

Numerous times throughout Lent I had people speak to me about the meaningfulness of our Lenten blogs, some of them following along from across the country. In their many forms, they were beautiful and insightful, each one a gift. My profound thanks to all of the writers and my great thanks to Betsy Fornal, Pam Gregory, and Rob Walsh who presided over the entirety of it all.

And I loved being inspired by your faithful witnesses (not an infrequent experience, I might add). Thanks to those who shared their stories. Thanks to Emma Peterson, our minister for digital evangelism, who recorded, edited, and posted them.

One thing that was not specific to Lent, but still unfolded during the past several weeks, was a fabulous adult faith book study of *Gender and the Nicene Creed*. Once again, each Wednesday night over twenty of us gathered on Zoom to share our thoughts, questions, and faith. I was amazed but not surprised by the rich conversation this ancient statement of the Church generated. We covered old ground; we covered new ground; and we walked and talked in a way that will forever inform my recitation of the Creed. I am grateful to everyone who participated in the class.

Then came Holy Week—and what a week it was—all live streamed, I hasten to add, thanks to Deborah Collins' duo of film makers, David Clifton and Bill Clement.

There are so many moving parts to the week and so many of you who made it possible. My thanks to Lisa Johnson, Liz Fox, and all the altar guild members, who set up for every service—and did particularly heavy lifting on Maundy Thursday.

My thanks to the preachers of Holy Week: Pam Gregory, Judith Sutphen, Patricia Warburton, and Nancy Arnold. Their sermons were creative, thoughtful, and deeply moving.

My thanks to the Maundy Thursday teams: set-up (Arlene Serdakowski, Ruth Haynsworth, Nancy Rudicil, and Lois McLoughlin), kitchen (headed by Paul Ruggieri, ably assisted by Margaret Clifton and a host of others), and clean-up (Paul Brookes, Britt Burch, John Lukens, and Stacey Nakasian). The dining room was so warm and inviting, the food was amazing, and by the night's

Maundy Thursday is such a rich night that it could make for a tough act to follow, and yet the Good Friday Taize service is even more beloved and beautiful to many, both within the parish and the wider community. I have experienced it for several years now, but the music provided by the choir never fails to move me. We all owe the choir our great thanks.

And then, finally, we get to our Easter celebrations, which include a powerful Easter Vigil on Saturday night (followed by champagne and chocolate-covered strawberries courtesy of Anna Pilkington) and two joy-filled Easter services Sunday morning. Again, the altar guild came out in full force to decorate the church; the choirs provided spectacular music; and a host of liturgical players from ushers to LEM's to readers played their critical parts.

Even now, as I re-read this note, I marvel at the countless persons who made our Lent and Easter so wonderful!

And, of course, no thank you note regarding the season would be complete without thanking our wonderful staff. Christina tends to so many aspects of our corporate life with kindness, patience, and care. Rodney leads the choirs with all the same qualities as well as amazing creativity. Jonathan's contributions over this span of time, which ranged from pastoral care to fabulous preaching (if you weren't at our Vigil, watch his sermon online) were critical to the care and feeding of our entire congregation, myself included. I am so grateful to all of them.

I feel so blessed to share this work with all of them, just as I feel so blessed to share Lent and Easter with all of you. I never take for granted all that you do and all that we share. If Lent and Easter are about service and faith, forgiveness and patience, grace and love, then I can not imagine a better group of people to have as companions as I make my way through these seasons. For that, I say, thank you. And thanks be to God.

#### Adult Faith Formation

The Adult Faith Formation classes for April resume next Wednesday, April 19, with two nights of brief videos (the 2<sup>nd</sup> night being April 26) by noted religious leader and author Rob Bell. On the 19<sup>th</sup> we will view Bell's video entitled "Rhythm." Here's his summary description:

1. NOOMA "Rhythm" (011 Rob Bell DVD)

"What does it mean to have a relationship with God? What does it look like? For a lot of us it's a hard thing to fully understand. If God is an infinite spirit with no shape or form, how can we possibly relate to that? And what about Jesus? He said he came to give everyone life in its fullest. He came to show us how to live. Maybe its through trusting Jesus and living the kind of life he taught us to live – a life of truth, love, justice, compassion, forgiveness, and sacrifice – that we have a relationship with God. Maybe the way we live every day, every single choice we make, determines how in tune with God we are."

On the 26<sup>th</sup> we will view his video, "Dust." Here's what he says about this video:

2. NOOMA "Dust" (008 Rob Bell)

"Believing in God is important, but what about God believing in us? Believing that we can actually be the kind of people we were meant to be. People of love, compassion, peace, forgiveness, and hope. People who try to do the right thing all of the time. Who act on the endless opportunities around us every day for good, beauty, and truth. It's easy for us to sometimes get down on ourselves. To feel 'not good enough' or feel like we don't have what it takes. But maybe if we had more insight into the culture that Jesus grew up in and some of the radical things he did, we'd understand the faith that God has in all of us."

### Corporate Communion

Dear Parents,

We are in the planning stages for the Corporate Communion program at St. Luke's Church.

It is open to all children in the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grades.

Children understand the symbolism and significance of the Eucharist in ways that are often surprising and delightful. It is no wonder that Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me!"

Since the 1991 *Prayerbook*, our church has lived into the theology that Baptism is full initiation into the Body of Christ, moving away from the idea that Confirmation and "understanding" are the

bench marks for participation in the Eucharist.

Corporate Communion is a remarkable communion instruction , *not preparation class* . It is designed to offer age-appropriate theology, liturgy and tradition to children. **Children are not the future of the church; they are the church today.** This class honors their full membership in the Body of Christ, and equips us grownups for the vows we made at their Baptism that we would support them in their life in Christ.

- Compared to 2022, we are a little behind - \$5,000 of that is Curate funding we no longer receive and pledge and loose plate are good to budget, but behind last year's numbers.
- Expenses are \$15,000 under budget, and in line with 2022 spending.
- Net income is \$17,753 ahead of budget

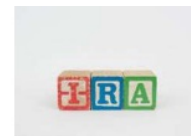

## Job Opening

### Job Opening - Part-time Coordinator for Youth and Family Programs

While it is Fr. Tim’s policy not to hire parishioners, if you have any friends who may be interested, please let us know.

St. Luke’s Church, an inclusive, thriving, multi-generational, and joy-filled church, located in the heart of East Greenwich, is looking for a part-time program coordinator (15-18 hours per week) to expand our ministries with youth and their families.

Essential hopes and expectations include oversight of our youth faith formation offerings (curriculum selection and preparation, teacher recruitment and support), enhanced activities of a fledgling youth group, weekly communication with parents regarding how they might further their children’s faith formation at home, and the development of a one-week summer Vacation Bible School.

Additional responsibilities include regular collaboration with the ministry team, the creation of seasonal offerings, assisting the rector with confirmation classes (February through May), and planning for our every-other-year mission trip to the Dominican Republic.

Appropriate candidates must have a love for youth, and a comfort and familiarity with the Christian tradition. Experience working in a youth-related setting a must; a background in education is helpful but not required.

Other important qualities and attributes include:

- Creativity
- Good sense of humor
- Strong interpersonal skills
- Flexibility
- A demonstrated capacity to work well with others
- An energetic and energizing disposition

The weekly hours are flexible, although presence most Sunday mornings is required. With the exception of a Vacation Bible School, Faith Formation classes pause from June through August, allowing for 6 weeks of vacation time.

Prior to shut down due to Covid, Saint Luke’s “Lunch on the Hill” offered lunches every Wednesday to our surrounding community with a focus on the clients of the Food Pantry. **“Lunch On The Hill” has resumed lunches on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday every month.**

You may recall that in the past lunches had been provided by local restaurants with sides being provided by the host Church. ## St. Luke's Choirs Sing for You!

As a special gift from the Canterbury, St. Cecilia, and Angel Choirs to our St. Luke's family and friends, choir members compiled a special 'arrangement' of "How Can I Keep From Singing". The music is from an American folk song originally composed by Baptist minister Robert Wadworth Lowry in 1868 with the four-part arrangement published by Jeffrey Honoré in 1991.
