<u>Weekday Morning Prayer</u>: Fr. Jarrett Kerbel, Interim Rector, will be leading Morning Prayer Tuesday through Friday at 8:30 am. Weather permitting, he will meet parishioners in the Lychgate on Church Street. The Lychgate is the covered entrance to the church burial ground, also called a Resurrection Gate! Inclement weather will move the service to the atrium. Please feel free to come once a week or any combination of days. Fr. Jarrett will follow the Book of Common Prayer and set aside ten minutes to reflect on the readings together as well as time for intercessory prayer. All Welcome!

Lectionary Bible Study Offered in August

The Interim Rector will offer a Bible Study on Tuesdays at 11:00 am - weather permitting in the Lyche Gate of the Cemetery or otherwise in the Atrium Library. We will study the readings for the Sunday ahead with special attention to the Gospel of John and the Epistle of the coming Sunday. If you are new to Bible Study, please give this short-term study a try. All thoughts, questions, reflections are welcome! From August 6 to August 20 and hopefully picking up again in September. Contact the Interim Rector if you have questions.

Save the Date for Transition Activities this Fall - Your presence is crucial.

On October 27 and December 8, we will have parish meetings after worship as part of the transition process. At our July meeting, the Vestry decided to have ONE SERVICE at 9 am on these days to worship as a unified congregation and to encourage turnout for these very important opportunities for reflection. This is your chance to have a voice, share your experiences of St. Luke's, listen to others, and work together with other members to shape the Parish Profile that will attract your next Rector.

Childcare and activities for younger children will be provided. Middle School and High School students are encouraged to attend. We urge all leaders throughout the parish to encourage your friends and family to attend.

October 27 will be the History Timeline exercise where we collectively reflect on the history of St. Lukes looking for strengths, weaknesses and patterns across time. What do we want to

continue? What do we want to leave behind? How are we being called by God to adapt, grow and thrive in our particular gifts?

On December 8, the Congregational Conversation will have all parishioners working together to answer a series of 12 questions that describe the church and the Rector the church wants to find. All data collected at both the History and Congregational Conversation events will be incorporated into the Parish Profile by the Parish Profile Committee to be used to search for the new rector.

We are blessed to have the leadership of the Rev. Canon Dena Cleaver-Bartholomew, Canon to the Ordinary of the Diocese of Rhode Island, to lead both sessions.

- April-May: Prayer team began drafting prayer to share in June
- Mid-May: Wardens and vestry began review of Interim candidates
- May-June: Communications team starts website review and Search site
- Overall transition process estimated to be 12-18 months, more to come ...

When September Comes

August is upon us! Time to get organized for September and the start of the program year at St. Luke's. Here are some key details to help you prepare and participate.

Kick-Off Sunday will be September 8 - Following the 10 am service we will have a special Coffee Connections in the Parish Auditorium and a Ministry Fair for Liturgical Ministries and Children & Youth Formation. We encourage all Liturgical Ministries - Choirs, Altar Guild, Acolytes, LEMS, Readers, Ushers, Newcomers, etc. to prepare a recruiting table.

On Sunday, September 15 - Following the 10 am service we will have a second Coffee Connections in the Parish Auditorium and a Ministry Fair for every other non-liturgical ministry that wants to recruit - Adult Faith Formation, Feeding Ministries, Morning Prayer, Bible Study, Dorcas, Women of Grace, Properties, Gardens, Office Volunteers, etc.

Be sure to bring some attractive snacks for your tables to attract a crowd, wear name tags, and always stand in front of your table to connect with people actively. BYO Signup sheets and attractive materials to explain your ministry and the level of commitment required.

Following these ministry engagement activities, we will send out a Time and Talent survey to the whole parish to make sure no one is missed! Data from this survey will be shared with ministry leaders to follow-up.

Reducing Water Usage

Reducing water use cuts the energy required to process and deliver it to homes, business, farms, and communities, which in turn helps to reduce pollution and conserve fuel resources and helps save the planet and your water bill.

To help children understand how easy it is to waste water, put the plug in the sink to show them just how much water fills up when you leave the tap running -a simple yet effective visual reminder to help them (and us!) understand the importance of water conservation.

Fr. Jarrett's Letter Continued...

First, Psalm 61 verse 2:

I will call upon you for the ends of the earth with heaviness in my heart; set me upon the rock that is higher than I.

My first response to this verse is always WOW! The first half of the verse delivers a primary gift of poetry, i.e. compelling words that help us express the deepest feelings of our heart. We are not alone in our heavy spirits. For thousands of years, fellow believers have stood with us in this appeal to God. The second phrase provides an awesome line to memorize and repeat in prayer. This stunning petition made from a place where our limitations and self-focus are dragging us down asks for a new standing place above our ego.

Repetitive prayer simply means gently repeating a word or phrase from scripture slowly to help us center our distracted minds and hearts so we become more available to our God who is always present. God is present, it is we who absent ourselves from God. As a monk once told me with tactless truth, "Get your SELF out of the way Jarrett." Easier said than done.

Second, Psalm 62, verse 1:

For God alone my soul in silence waits; from God comes salvation.

First of all, just relish the alliteration of the sibilants in the first phrase. Beauty is a divine gift so it is ok to revel in it as a means of encountering God's goodness. Secondly, memorize this verse and learn to repeat it gently to yourself in prayer as you open yourself to the contemplation of God. Our soul is already waiting upon God in silence. Let's use the skills of centering and contemplative prayer to silence the noise that separates us from our soul.

This verse helps me introduce two traditional modes of prayer. If you love imagery, imagination, and entering a story in a participatory way, then kataphatic prayer might be for you. This type of prayer encourages imagination. You take a bible verse or story and you explore it with your imagination. What is happening in this scene? Where am I in this scene? How am I feeling? What questions might I ask a character in the scene; Jesus or Mary or Peter? This method took me a minute to trust but it is quite amazing. Ignatius Loyola was a great teacher of this style of prayer.

The second form of prayer is apophatic prayer or the way of emptying out. In this style of prayer, we aim to become fully open to God by gently leaving behind all thoughts, feelings, distractions, preoccupations, etc. to meet God in our inner silence. *For God alone, my soul in silence waits. Set me on a rock higher than I.* While we can use methods adopted from Zen Buddhism and Vedic religions to practice emptying, we need to be clear that our aim is different. For the Christian Disciple, our goal is immersion and incorporation into the abundant life of God and communion with the Divine entity who is wholly other. We seek the fullness of God in Christ to root and ground ourselves in love.
