
The 1979 Book of Common Prayer of the Episcopal Church was a major leap forward in the liturgical practice of our Church. Baptism is one example where, by and large, congregations have not caught up with the changes implied by the rite. You might expect Jonathan and I to disagree about believers' Baptism versus infant Baptism. But the Book of Common Prayer actually favors the former over the latter.

Stewardship Benchmarks, Or How We Make It!

The vestry set a goal of a 20% increase in pledging for 2025. That percentage may seem daunting on the face of it but if you break it down it is very achievable.

Here are some benchmarks to help you think about making a pledge at St. Luke's:

Our average pledge is \$2,774

Our median pledge is \$1,500.

The median pledge we need to make our goal is \$1,775

The participation goal to make our funding goal is 225 pledging households.

We need 37 new pledging households to make our participation goal.

If 188 existing pledgers added \$275 to their pledge that generosity would produce an extra \$51,700 toward a fully funded budget in 2025

If we add 37 pledging households and those 37 give \$1,775 per year, that generous giving would produce \$65,675 toward a fully funded budget.

The result: WE REACH OUR GOAL of \$120,000 in new giving to balance our budget for 2025.

Aspirationally speaking, imagine if we had 100% participation in Stewardship and imagine if our givers were practicing tithing at 5% or 10% of net income. Imagine how we could serve the Kingdom



Online Banking

Bill Pay – with online bill pay, you add St. Luke's Church as a payee, enter our address of 99 Peirce St. East Greenwich, RI 02818 and schedule your payment.

Benefits: Ease of use – if you already use online bill pay, then you are familiar with making payments this way. You can schedule single payments or set up regular payments in advance.

No cost to you or the Church

Zelle Transfer

Zelle Payment – with Zelle payment transfer, you can add St. Luke's Church by using the giving@stlukeseg.org address.

Benefits: Ease of use – if you already use Zelle, then you are familiar with making payments this way. This only makes one payment at a time, so you will have to initiate each payment.

No cost to you or the Church

PayPal and VANCO Payment Solutions

PayPal and VANCO Payments – With PayPal and VANCO payments, you create your individual accounts on their sites, set up how you want to pay, and the funds are deposited in the Church's account

Benefits: If you like points or miles, then these are your sites! They are the only options that accept credit cards. Like Online Banking, you can set up recurring payments or make single payments.

Transaction Fees for the Church

Direct Payment From IRA

Direct Transfer – If you are 70½ or older, you can instruct your IRA provider to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution directly from your IRA.

Benefits: Any funds paid this way are not reported as taxable income to you. You can make your entire yearly pledge with one payment, help satisfy your required distribution, and incur no tax on the income.

An Update from the Treasurer

Notes:

- Income continues to outpace the budget with pledge income \$45K ahead of budget. I join the leadership and thanking each of you for your continued, timely support! (Yes, I think you are all amazing!)
- Expenses are pretty much on budget at this point we have some property expenses coming up that will hit in the 4th quarter.

E-pistle continued from above:

Does this surprise you? You are not alone. When you examine the Baptism service on page 301 you will notice that "Adults and Older Children" are listed first as candidates for Baptism. This is the subtle Prayer Book way of indicating priority. While we believe that infant and adult baptism are both valid and effective sacraments, we recognize that the ability of an adult or an older child to consent to the sacrament adds a decisive element to it.

My children love to tease me by saying, "You Baptized us against our will!" They are correct. I reply to them that parents do lots of things against the will of a child; we send you to school for example, we feed you healthy food etc. In general, it is recognized as acceptable for a mature parent to look out for the good of the child beyond what the child is able to choose for themselves. This is parental love.

When a parent baptizes a child, we are initiating them into an unbreakable relationship with God through Jesus Christ. Child Baptism particularly emphasizes the fact that this relationship is a pure gift

and wholly the initiative of God. Jesus died and rose again well before we were around to respond to or affirm his action. Jesus opened the way to eternal life for us when humanity was unable to will it open for ourselves, and so delivered it to us as an unmerited gift.

I Baptized my children as infants because the sacrament highlights this quality of gift given without regard to our earning it in any way. At the same time, I also hoped my children would choose confirmation later in life so they could respond to God's gift from their own mature will. Traditionally, this is how the Episcopal Church has tried to balance respect for the pure gift with respect for the need of autonomous people to turn to God by their own consent.

So you see why an adult or believers' baptism might have some advantages. In it, both elements are unified. We are baptized into the gift of a relationship with God, initiated and guaranteed by God. Our autonomous 'YES' to that gift shows we have made an adult decision to receive the gift and be recognized as a follower of Jesus Christ within the Church.

Whichever you choose for your child, your choice will be honored and respected at St. Luke's!

For me, there are some other reasons to favor adult baptism. First, baptizing teens and adults is already becoming more prevalent because so many people are being raised outside of the church. Second, and related, adult and teen baptism avoids some of the dangers of cultural Christianity; i.e. the performative participation in religious rites without an actual personal commitment to the gift given and the public promises made in response. How many times have I asked families during Baptism if they will raise their children in the knowledge and love of Jesus and in the active fellowship of the Church only to never see them again at worship?

Because the sacrament is a gift from God and not mine to control or police, I will always offer baptism in hope that the response will be genuine, even converting. Whatever the case may be, God's saving love is powerful, active, and sufficient. Whether as an adult or a child, whether committed or

lukewarm, we all are invited to live into the fathomless grace of our Baptismal relationship with the Risen Christ our whole life long.


