
"We are all Jews," Sergeant Edmonds replied.

Our Rector Search – All Voices Matter!

In the next several weeks, St. Luke's Nominating Committee will be developing a process for vetting a Search Committee for our next Rector. The Nominating Committee was approved by the parish at our 189th Annual Meeting on January 28, 2024. Members of the Nominating Committee include: the Senior Warden, Deborah Collins; Mike Grady (member-at-large); Holly O'Brien (vestry alum from 2023); Pam Dresselhouse (Fr. Rich/Rector's choice); and Bill Warburton (member-at-large). These individuals will lay out a process to define our goals for the rector search, the expectations of the Search Committee, and the timeline for the Search Committee's work. Essential to the work of the Search Committee is the expectation that they represent the parish voice in all aspects of their work. That said, the Search Committee will be comprised of a representative group of parishioners from all walks of life within our parish. Participation in the primary parish events (History Event on October 27

and Congregational Conversations on December 8) is required to join the search committee. Our collective voices will be heard at these events and Search Committee members need to be there to contribute and listen. That collective voice will provide the backbone of our parish profile. Parishioners are asked to stay tuned for the Search Committee outreach and application process which will be shared in mid-November.

Stewardship Benchmarks, Or How We Make It!

The vestry set a goal of a 20% increase in pledging for 2025.

That percentage may seem daunting on the face of it but if you break it down it is very achievable.



Here are some benchmarks to help you think about making a pledge at St. Luke's:

Our average pledge is \$2,774

Our median pledge is \$1,500.

The median pledge we need to make our goal is \$1,775

The participation goal to make our funding goal is 225 pledging households.

We need 37 new pledging households to make our participation goal.

If 188 existing pledgers added \$275 to their pledge that generosity would produce an extra \$51,700 toward a fully funded budget in 2025

If we add 37 pledging households and those 37 give \$1,775 per year, that generous giving would produce \$65,675 toward a fully funded budget.

The result: WE REACH OUR GOAL of \$120,000 in new-giving to balance our budget for 2025. Aspirationally speaking, imagine if we had 100% participation in Stewardship and imagine if our givers were practicing tithing at 5% or 10% of net income. Imagine how we could serve the Kingdom of God!



New dates are revealed after each Sunday passes.


Lay Readers should sign up once a month.

An Update from the Treasurer

- Income continues to outpace the budget with pledge income \$45K ahead of budget. I join the leadership and thanking each of you for your continued, timely support! (Yes, I think you are all amazing!)
- Expenses are pretty much on budget at this point we have some property expenses coming up that will hit in the 4th quarter.

E-pistle continued from above:

The red-faced German officer drew his side-arm and pressed the barrel to Sergeant Edmond's forehead and commanded him to tell the Jewish members of his unit to step forward or he would be shot in the head. Edmonds stood still and replied, "You could shoot me, but we all know your name. This war is almost over and you will be tried as a war criminal." The German Major turned on his heels and stalked off.

Thanks be to God for courage.

I heard this story told at Temple Sinai in Cranston on Monday night and I was deeply moved. Thank God for people who demonstrate heroic courage. They give us hope for humanity. They shine a light in the darkness. They inspire us to cultivate fortitude in our hearts, souls and bodies for the day when a witness is demanded of us.

As a speaker on the panel at the Temple, I shared that Sergeant Edmond's example caused me to reflect deeply on solidarity. Who do I stand with? Who is my neighbor? If our country takes an authoritarian turn and mass deportations are ordered, will I be prepared to stand with asylum seekers and undocumented workers and say, "We are all immigrants." Will I be ready to put my body between the vulnerable and the authorities? Will I be willing to be injured or jailed?

My hope is for a different future, but I believe strongly that my faith calls me to be prepared. Every day, I need to develop the virtues of discernment and courage before I need them in a crisis. Courage comes from believing that the light overcomes the darkness, that Jesus rose again from the dead to free us from the power of death that keeps us fearful and fawning. We take faithful risks guided by our

values and based on God's promise to stand with us when we do so, and to never let us go.
